EXPRESS CHARGES ARE TOO HIGH NOW

Vegetable and Fruit Growers' Protest Against Further Increase.

Strong representations were made before the Railway Board yesterday at its meeting in the city hall, by the different fruit and vegetable growers' associations, against any proposed increase in the express charges on their products. It was declared that the charges are already so high that the profit of the producer is reduced to a minimum.

The city of London Industrial Bureau made an application along with the City of London and the London board of trade for an order directing the express companies to extend their delivery limits in the city of London. P. H. Philpott, K.C., representing the express companies, said that they were willing to meet the requirements for the public convenience as far as possible, and he submitted a plan to the board as a basis for delivery. It was suggested by him to extend their delivery limits to a city or town, it should apply to that particular place only.

A decision was reserved in the case. An application by the City of Toronto for an order apportioning the cost of alterations made in the Concession Gas Company's mains, necessitated by the construction of subways at Yonge street, Avenue road, Davenport road, Howland avenue, Spadina road, Bathurst street, Shaw street, Christie street, Davenport road and Ossington avenue, in connection with the grade separation work at North York, was by consent adjourned to be heard at Ottawa on Jan. 21.

The board reserved decision in the application of the Toronto Tramway Company for permission to lay and maintain its conduits for its steam pressure steam lines for heating, from the new Union Station across Bay street, Yonge street and Scott street. T. S. Fairly, who represented the city, said that notice had been served on the Toronto Electric Light Co. that the city is going to expropriate them. "Granting this application would be adding another incubus, I don't think that the Terminal Company comes under the Railway Act."

NO SIGN OF AMNESTY FOR M.S.A. DEFAULTERS

All defaulters under the M.S.A. in this district are being rounded up by the civilian department of the military police, under the direction of Capt. T. C. Flanagan. There have been several rumors that all these defaulters would be pardoned under a general amnesty, but so far this has not been done and the department is showing no laxness in its duty.

The defaulters come under three headings, those who did not register under the Act, those who did not report to the medical boards when ordered to do so and those who deserted from their units. Some in the first two classes defaulted unintentionally. Their cases will be treated accordingly.

In several instances various sentences have been imposed through the district, the severest being at Sudbury where one, Whistler, was sentenced to four years in the penitentiary. A list of those who defaulted in any way under the Act is being prepared by the registrar's department, and when it is complete, all whose names appear thereon will be taken into custody.

AT THE REGENT.

"The Romance of Tarzan" at the Regent Theatre this week, picks up the story of Tarzan where it left off in "Tarzan of the Apes." We find Tarzan leaving his jungle home, set sail in a tramp schooner and finally land at San Francisco, from where he goes in search of the Porter home. On the trail to the ranch he is overtaken by bandits and hears of their scheme to abduct Jane Porter. PLAYS, PICTURES AND MUSIC

"OH, BOY!" "PENROD" AT PRINCESS. "SWEET INNISFALLEN."

"Oh, Boy!" The Comstock and Elliott musical comedy at the Royal Alexandra Theatre this week, is full of comedy and useful music, and is carried along by the spontaneous play of Anna Wheaton, a comedienne of rare ability.

The play opens in the bachelor apartments of George Budd (Charles Compton), where a party is being given by his friend, Jim Marvin (Hal Forde). Budd has been married secretly that night, but his young bride decides she will return home and that they will keep the marriage a secret. She leaves for home, but leaves part of her wardrobe behind, and complications arise when Jackie Sampson (Anna Wheaton), an actress, comes in via the escape to avoid a policeman who when she has struck in a melee at a cafe. When the policeman arrives Jackie is introduced as Mrs. Budd in order to explain the situation. From then on it is a series of complications which are all straightened out in the last act.

There are several useful musical numbers, the best known and most popular being "Till the Clouds Roll By." An Old-Fashioned Wife, "Nesting Time." Anna Wheaton receives excellent support for her comedy in Hal Forde, while Elsie Wrenn (real estate agent, 161 Roncesvalles avenue) is most attractive; but it is to Anna Wheaton that the honors of "Oh, Boy!" fall.

LUCILLE CAVANAGH.

One of the big houses that have been the order of the day since the opening of the season, greeted the matinee performance at the Regent yesterday, when Lucille Cavanagh headed the bill in a series of dances performed in an environment of brilliant color and interspersed with song. Miss Cavanagh is as noted for her variety in dress as she is for versatile work in the top-of-the-line and yesterday lived up to her reputation in both. She was assisted by Wheeler Wadsworth, Mel Craig and William B. Taylor.

Comedy Four in their offering of cleverly arranged comedy quartets and side-splitting antics. They were recalled again and again. Those who like good red-blooded melodrama, with a strong love theme interwoven, can't go wrong if they go to see "Sporting Life," which is making such a record-breaking run at the Allen Theatre. Everything in the line of sports, from boxing to horse racing, is introduced, and it can be safely said that this production, which is an English drama, has lost nothing in the picturization.

The story itself deals with the attempt of an English lord to recoup his losses in gaming, by one last plunge on a boxing match, and by entering his horse in the Derby. How the fighter whom the peer backed is kidnapped, and how the aristocrat himself enters the ring, and wins the fight, makes one of the most engrossing pictures in the city this week.
