The original material was probably granite, while the fine-grained lava before fusion and volcanism was probably diorite or gabbro, both basic as distinguished from acid rocks.

Lavas derived from granite are called rhyolite. If from syenite, they are known as trachyte, while diorite makes andesite, and gabbro basalt. The percentage of silica gradually decreases from rhyolite to basalt.

Physical and chemical changes have, however, been so extensive at Porcupine that identification of these different types of lava is extremely difficult. As already stated, the coarse-grained friable lava on the Hollinger and Sovereign was probably rhyolite. Its high silica content points to this, and it is fully established that rocks high in silica are more favorable for the precious metals than the more basic rocks in which iron replaces a part of the

The noble yellow metal is derived from the molten mass beneath the solid crust of the earth, and, strange as it may appear, the medium of transportation is water highly heated and under great pressure. The gold rises in solution along with silica and other elements, and as the solution cools and pressure diminishes the various elements segregate out and are precipitated in the veins.

Obviously this process cannot go on without a vent or channel, though sometimes the gold finds its way along mere lines of weakness, and, with the other elements, actually replaces the original rock. It is therefore plain that a friable rock is much preferable to a fine-grained compact one. We have already shown that Cobalt's 400,000,000 ounces of silver are due to the friability of the Cobalt series.

It is also plain that, granted a volcanic vent, such as we find on the Hollinger and Sovereign, all the material therein must be of the same composition. It poured out in a molten state after millions of years of fusion and thorough mixture of the different elements. These and many other considerations give us absolute faith in the merits of the Sovereign Porcupine Gold Mines. If the Hollinger people have the real thing, so have we. much at all events cannot be gainsaid.

It is certain that a great rise in gold stocks is about to begin. As soon as the peace treaty is signed we expect that the shares of the Sovereign Porcupine will be freely salable at par or over.
