New York, March 21.-Under yester day's date James Creelman cables from Athens to The Journal: Prime Minister Delyannis to-day authorized me to make public the following declaration as a result of a talk with him. It is the first actual threat uttered by the responsible head of the Greek Government: "If the great powers will not be convinced of the injustice and impracticability of the measure they have decided upon, the situation will become worse and probably may become uncontrollable, nor is it possible to foresee the result, but it will be unjust to throw upon Greece the responsibility for what may follow."

The gravity of this statement may be judged by the fact that Delyannis is opposed to war.

The barracks of the Turkish troops are being prepared for the reception of 1600 international troops, who will land here in a few days. There will be landed in all the towns in the island 3600 European troops. Five hundred English troops are to be stationed at Heraklion. This seems an utterly insufficient force to keep order among 45,000 Moslems, crowded in that town. The whole management of European interference here shows a lamentable ignorance on the part of those directing affairs.
