NEGROES SHOT WHITES DEAD

And There is Danger of a Race War in Georgia—Blacks Shot an Officer Also.

Sylvania, Ga., Aug. 13.—What is likely to result in a race war in a locality here occurred Saturday night when R. F. Harrington and Milton Means, driving home, met two negroes named Alexander and a white man named Thompson. The negroes drew pistols and shot Harrington and Means dead.

The news quickly spread, and Captain Jesse L. Wade organized a posse to capture the murderers. As the posse approached the house of the Alexanders, a number of shots in rapid succession were fired into it. Captain Wade fell mortally wounded. The posse withdrew and went for Sheriff Thompson. The sheriff, with a reinforced posse, started in pursuit.

In the section where the tragedy occurred, the black population considerably outnumbered the white, and it is said the colored neighbors of the Alexanders will assist them in resisting the sheriff.

PROMINENT PEOPLE DEAD.

New York, Aug. 13.—William M. Gravenhorst, consul for the Netherlands, died at his home in Brooklyn yesterday, aged 64.

Death of Prof. Keeler.

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—Prof. James E. Keeler, the eminent astronomer, for the last two years director of the Lick Observatory, Mount Hamilton, is dead. He was a native of Illinois, and aged 63 years.

Major Whitney is Dead.

Washington, Aug. 13.—Adjutant-General Corbin received a cable message this morning from Gen. Michael A. Whitney of the 6th Infantry, that he had died at Manila on the 11th inst. of heart disease.

FRIENDS QUARRELLED.

Edgar Connor Shot Levi Goodpastor and Then Himself—They Were Chums.

Owensville, Ky., Aug. 13.—After coming to blows with Levi Goodpastor over a discussion of a fight he had had a moment ago with another man, Edgar Connor shot and killed Goodpastor. With his last breath Goodpastor said: "Edgar, you have killed me. Lay me down and let me die. Tell all the boys goodbye."

Hearing these words, Connor shot and killed himself. Goodpastor and Connor were room mates and had been the best of friends.

FIGHT FOR EIGHT-HOUR DAY.

Millmen and Building Trades Council of San Francisco Will Strike.

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—The Millmen's Union, backed by the Building Trades Council, today began in earnest its fight for an eight-hour day. A strike has been ordered and the strength of the movement will soon be known.

The union men ask for the same pay for eight hours as is now given for nine hours' work. The millmen say they cannot grant the demand and meet eastern competition.
