NO REFUND WILL BE GIVEN.  
Fox Terrier Club's Application for Return of Portion of Rent of Pavilion Not Entertained.

The Parks and Exhibition Committee yesterday afternoon refused to entertain the application of the Canadian Fox Terrier Club for a refund of rent of the Pavilion.
