RESUME OF CASE. Salient Features of the Act That Caused All the Trouble. "It is expedient to suppress the liquor traffic in Manitoba by prohibiting the importation of liquor."

That is the preamble of the Liquor or Prohibition Act which the Manitoba government passed on July 1900 to come into force on June 1, and which the Supreme Court of that province declared unconstitutional because, in a word, it interfered with the trade of the province.

Has the Legislature power to prohibit the importation of liquor into Manitoba, as it has authority to declare it illegal for an importer to employ an agent residing in the province to make the importation on his behalf or to prohibit the importation through such agent?
