CANADA'S OLDEST PRINTER DEAD.

Robert Graham Passes Away in His 82nd Year.

Probably the oldest printer in Canada passed away yesterday afternoon, in the person of Robert Graham of 83 Seaton street.

He came to Toronto sixty-five years ago from Belfast, and was one of the original members of the Typographical Union over sixty years ago.

He conducted a printing business on King street, where the Manning Arcade now is, and also on Yonge street, where Webb's restaurant stands.

Deceased, who was in his 82nd year, was only ill since Saturday, and death was unexpected.

He is survived by a widow, two sons, Robert and John, and a daughter. The funeral will take place this afternoon at St. James' Cemetery.

KICKED BY A HORSE.

Glencoe, June 13.—While attempting to hitch a team of horses to a post on the street here this morning Mrs. R. C. Twiss met with a very painful accident. The horses, frightened by a passing train, broke away from Mrs. Twiss, who, in attempting to regain the lost bridle reins, was kicked in the back of the head by one of the frightened animals, and in a moment lay unconscious on the road. She was picked up and carried into J. N. Currie's store, and then to the American House, near by, where her wounds were dressed by Drs. Walker, McLachlan and Mr. McIntyre. Mrs. Twiss regained consciousness after some little time, and after seriously hurt, it is now thought that she will recover.

ARRESTED IN HAVANA.

Montreal, June 13.—(Special.)—D. A. Hamel, formerly city policeman, who forged a cheque for \$99.36 on the Bank of Montreal and absconded with the money, has been arrested in Havana. A private wire was received in the city to that effect this morning. It is understood that the arrest was made by Chief Carpenter, at the instance of the Bank of Montreal, and Hamel will be detained, awaiting extradition proceedings, if such a course is possible.

GERMAN DENIES.

Ottawa, June 13.—(Special.)—W. M. German, rising to a question of privilege in the house to-day, denied the charge made in the house by Col. Sam Hughes, that he, Mr. German, had interfered with the extension of the command of Col. Gregory of the St. Catharines Field Battery. He denied also having said that Lord Dufferin could not grant the extension and characterized Col. Hughes' statement as the "product of a vivid imagination."

C.O.F. CONVENTION.

Nearly 40 out-of-town delegates to the convention of the High Court of if of Canadian Order of Foresters, which opens to-day, are at the Rosin.

TO GROUP OR NOT TO GROUP A PROBLEM IN EDUCATION

Management Committee Receives Report of Principals' Committee.

The report of the principals of the High and Technical Schools regarding reorganization was received at the meeting of the management committee of the board of education last night. In spirit the report shows strong disapproval for the concentration of work, by using one collegiate institute for matriculation work and the other two for those pupils who desire merely a "higher" education. It approves of the suggestion that commercial students be removed to one school. In regard to concentrating a portion of the work where the classes are small the report says that the only subject where the change might be used would be Greek, and that even there it would have a tendency to draw away the best pupils from the other two schools and thus remove the chief incentive of the teachers, and the ultimate result would be to kill the study of Greek altogether. In grouping all the pupils who intend taking matriculation or teachers' certificate examinations there are even more difficulties. The school thus set apart would soon become the only school. It had been suggested that the pupils in the two highest grades be put into one school. The result of this would be that a certain degradation would fall on the two schools to which the lower grades of work were assigned.

The report concluded with this paragraph: "The principals desire also to remind the committee that the education department is at present preparing a new curriculum to come into force in September next. In the practical working out of this curriculum conditions may be developed which might require many modifications, and perhaps a classification of the collegiate institutes on one of the lines suggested. It would seem wise to defer making any changes at the present time further than those already recommended and approved of."

Trustee Parkinson insisted that there should be one school where examinations counted and two where they did not. The examination system controlled and dominated the teaching. Principal Empey said that examinations were a help rather than a hindrance. They taught a pupil to concentrate his thoughts and were an incentive to acquiring order in knowledge.

A letter from the education department stated that in a city like Toronto principals had a right to pass pupils into the high schools without examination, but that they were responsible to the department for each pupil's fitness.

The committee recommended the Union Jack charts to supply the schools.

Inspector Hughes has issued a letter that is to be sent to the parents of the pupils showing them the courses of study which may be pursued on leaving the public schools.

The matter of a monthly paper for the schools came up again. Principal Ritchie of Palmerston avenue school submitted some copies of the paper published in his school. Trustee Walker was not pleased with some of the news contained in the paper. They were too much of the "On Dit" style of literature, and bred an unhealthy desire for newspaper publicity.

The schools will close on June 30 and will be re-opened on Sept. 6. The committee will recommend the following schedule of fees for the high schools: Form I, \$6; Form II, \$3; Form III, \$15; Form IV, \$21; Form V, \$27.

It was decided that the teachers of the Model School should receive extra money. Principals Groves will get \$100, and each of the 11 teachers will receive \$25. The money is that received by the board for the expenses of the model school, and is made up of \$150 from the government, \$150 from the city and \$85 from the students of the Normal School.

Swaim, from Kew Beach to Dufferin school; Miss S. Noble, from Dufferin to Kew Beach school; Miss K. L. Steiner, from E. S. Steiner, from Brock avenue to Dufferin school; Miss C. M. Cronk, from Dovercourt to Brock avenue school.

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SHADOWS OF COMING EVENTS?

Dance Rumor Indicates in Discrepancy Street Railway Troubles.

It is expected that the conference to be held today between the street railway employees and the officials of the road will result in some definite conclusion being reached.

The committee of the men have been instructed to obtain some proposition that can be submitted in definite form to the mass meeting to be held to-morrow. The employees are becoming restless on account of the many rumors about in regard to preparations being made by the company to secure possible trouble that may arise.

"Just say I declined to be interviewed," said Mr. Keating of the Toronto Street Railway, when questioned as to the report that the company had been in the Yorkville bars, evidently to be used for cooking purposes by strike-breakers.

Inquiry among some of the employees at the Yorkville bars showed that since Saturday morning gas pipes have been laid, and several gas cooking stoves are also being placed in the kitchen of the company's house at the corner of the conference which has been in progress over a week.

RECOVERED BODY FROM THE BAY.

Remains of Harold Douglass Will Be Sent Home To-day.

Ex-Constable Williams yesterday afternoon recovered the body of Harold Douglass in the bay very near the spot where the young man was drowned. The remains were taken to Millard's undertaking establishment, and will be sent to Owen Sound to-day.

Arthur Rust of the city engineer's department makes a complaint which emphasizes the lamentable lack of facilities available in cases of emergency along the water front. He telephoned police headquarters immediately after the accident to get the services of some one with grappling irons, and the first question he was asked by the police was "Are you going to pay?" If not, the victim's friends would arrange in the ordinary course.

At present when a drowning occurs it is left to relatives and friends to secure the services of Mr. Williams, who receives nothing from the city. It is also said that there is a deficient supply of emergency life preservers and poles distributed along the wharves.
