One right claimed by the county and refused by the city was that in the management of the new hospital the former should have one member to represent them on the trust board, as is the case at present. To this the committee would not agree, on the ground that it would prevent the council taking the control of the hospital out of the hands of the trust if it were so decided upon a vote of the people. A compromise was effected, and it is now understood between the two parties that the county can get representation only

As the members wended their weary way homeward in the light of early dawn, they congratulated themselves that, so far as they were concerned, they had gone through the last-although the longest-act of the hospital agreement controversy.


