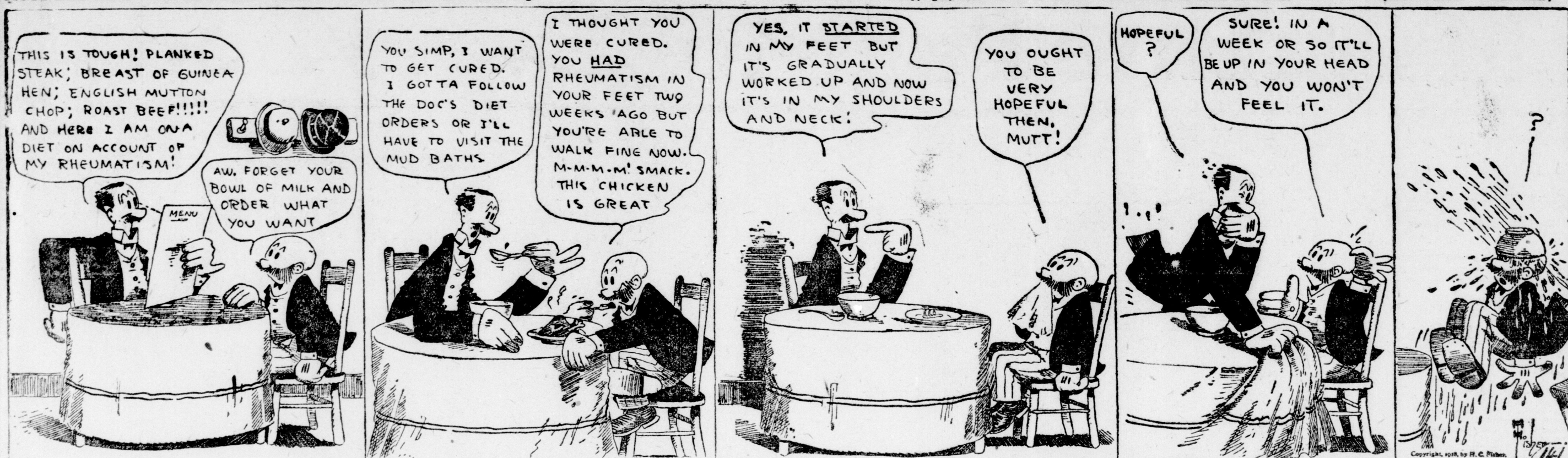

## UNIFORM STAKE RACES ON MICHIGAN SHORTSHIP

SAGINAW, Mich., March 17.—Uniform stake races to be contested at seven of the eight meetings of the Michigan Shortship circuit were announced Saturday by Secretary Morris. The stake classes agreed upon by the state race secretaries at Detroit the past week are 2:17, 2:12 and 2:08 paces, and 2:18 and 2:14 trots, by \$100 purses, and a 2:20 trot for 3-year-olds for \$500. Mount Clemens, Dexter Park at Detroit, Port Huron, Saginaw, Bay City, Kalamazoo and Okemos are the cities that will give these stakes. An important announcement made by Secretary Morris was the decision to give six moneys instead of four at all circuit races this year. This rule will appeal especially to race fans, as it will leave six horses instead of four after the fourth heat in split heat races, the rules allowing only those horses standing for money to remain after the fourth heat.

## STANLEY CUP SERIES AT TORONTO THIS WEEK

The Vancouver hockey club, champions of the Pacific Coast League, are on their way east to play in defence of the Stanley cup, and the opening match will be staged next Wednesday night in Toronto. Dates were announced by President Calder on Saturday as follows:

First game, Wednesday, March 20.  
Second game, Saturday, March 23.  
Third game, Monday, March 25.  
Fourth of fifth games are necessary, they will be played respectively on the 27 and 29.

Negotiations are now under way between the two leagues concerning the matter of referees. The Toronto club is anxious to use Crawford and Jack Adams in the series, these players being ineligible through the fact that they signed with Toronto after February 1st. President Frank Patrick of the Pacific Coast League, on Friday wired to Manager Charlie Quenneville of the Toronto club, extending his congratulations on the Blue Shirts' victory, and inquired whether the Toronto club was willing to accept a referee from the Pacific Coast League. It is quite possible that this arrangement will be made. It is thought probable that "Mickey" Lons, the former Tecumseh lacrosse player, will be the official, as he is coming with the coast team.

Cyclone Taylor, the leading scorer of the Western League, will be a big attraction in himself. Taylor is a speed marvel of the first water and a clean player.

The mode of play on the coast is clean and fast. The Blue Shirts are not any sign of the fact that they are going, and it should be the greatest series of the season.

The players share in the first three games of the series only, and the fans can rest assured that they will try to get it over as soon as possible. Hockey followers will have a chance for the first time to see a real penalty system in operation in a pro fixture.

## TORONTO DENTALS' CLEAN SWEEP OF CLEVELAND SERIES

## Cleveland Fans Want Canadians Back for Another Series.

[Special to The Advertiser.] CLEVELAND, March 16.—In a game that was even more bitterly contested than Friday night's great contest, the Dentals of Toronto tonight again defeated the Cleveland hockey team, winning 2 to 2. As a result, the Canadians made a clean sweep of the series, winning both games, and scoring seven goals to three for Cleveland.

The Dentals Friday night had much to do with the result. Tonight it was evened up, Cleveland playing just as good hockey, and toward the latter part of the contest having the better of the argument. Tonight the Canadians on the defensive, but try as they would, the Sixth City Puck-chasers could not get the puck past C. Stewart when a drive into the net meant the tying up of the score.

It was probably the fastest hockey exhibition ever staged at the Elysium, and gradually the play became rough, and at one time it looked as if a free-for-all fight was to be staged owing to the rough tactics employed by C. Stewart of the Dentals. First Trimble and then Debernardi suffered at the hands of Stewart, and when Dutch Jennings was knocked out when the Dental whacked him in the face with his stick, as a result, Dentals was unable to continue and Stewart was penalized by the referee, and just to show their good sportsmanship the Dental management removed him from the game.

But the game was anybody's battle, neither team having much advantage. It was a battle royal from start to finish, with hair-raising rushes, hard checking, pretty stick-handling and brilliant combination play being prominent throughout. It was the individual ability and sterling hockey played by Fox which enabled Dentals to win out. His work fairly scintillated, and two of the three Dental goals came as the direct result of his efforts. All in all the Dentals are by far the best team that has appeared here lately for several years, and already the Cleveland fans are clamoring for their being brought back for a return engagement. Manager Kilgus will bring the Dentals back if proper arrangements can be made.
