

## ASKS CONGRESS FOR REDRESS

Organized Labor Petitions Investigation of Three Western Miners' Arrest.

Washington, March 5.—Organized labor has asked Congress to institute an investigation into all the facts and circumstances attending the arrest in Colorado of Charles H. Moyer, William D. Haywood and George F. Pettibone, officers of the Western Federation of Miners, and their deportation to Idaho to stand trial on charges of complicity in the murder of Governor Frank Steiensen.

To that end Senator Carmack today presented a petition signed by hundreds of working men and citizens and also had printed in the record, the dissenting opinion of Associate Justice McKenna to the opinion of the supreme court of the United States that the court could not inquire into the circumstances surrounding the alleged "kidnapping" of the three men.

Senator Heyburn then secured an order for the printing of the majority opinion of the court.

The petition asked for the enactment of "such laws and measures as may be required to redress the wrongs committed against Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, and to safeguard and protect the citizens of this country from legalized kidnapping and deportations by administrative order in the future."

The fact that these men had not been in Idaho for several years prior to the time they were arrested for complicity in the Steiensen murder, is recited. It is declared the decision of the supreme court, that it could not inquire into the alleged "conspiracy" of the governors of Idaho and Colorado, "legalizes the crime of kidnapping and puts in the hands of corporate interests power by which they may lay hands upon citizens of any state, tear them from their homes and firesides, deposit them in any state, and thrust them in prison, there to remain without trial for months or years, thus depriving citizens of this country of their right of life and liberty without process of law."

The petition emphasizes the claim that the western federation of miners is "a large and peaceful organization of labor."

## LATE MRS. RICHARD SHAW

Death and Obsequies of Esteemed Resident of Dorchester.

Mrs. Eliza Walker, dearly beloved wife of John W. Walker, succumbed to an attack of pneumonia, Tuesday, Feb. 23, at her beautiful home, Dorchester Station, after an illness of only eight days. Mrs. Walker was born at Dorchester in 1864. She early affiliated herself with the Methodist Church and lived the Christian life. She is survived by a husband and three boys—Charles, Alfred and Richard. The interment took place Thursday afternoon, in the Dorchester Union Cemetery, and was largely attended. The chief mourners were the husband and sons; Mrs. Charles Hunter, Dorchester, mother; Mrs. Richard Shaw, Dorchester, sister; Mrs. George Myers, Alberta, sister; Messrs. Nicholas Grant, Frank Howitt and George Walker, London, brothers-in-law; Mrs. W. A. Gill, Mrs. Jos. Turner, Dorchester, nieces; Miss Fannie Howitt and Miss Nellie Grant, London, nieces. The floral tributes comprised a cross from the ladies of the Methodist Church, bouquet from Dorchester pupils attending Ingersoll Collegiate; bouquet from Mrs. Drake and daughter (London), wreath from mother and sister, wreath from other members of the family. The casket was borne by Messrs. Frank Hunter, Thomas Hunter, Robert Farquhar, William Williams, Walter Lane and John McCann. The obsequies in the Methodist Church were conducted by Rev. John Holmes, who took for his text, Psalms, lxxviii, 18. Mrs. McCrimmon sang a solo, "The Clouds Will Clear By-and-By," and the choir sang "Face to Face," as the people viewed the remains. Miss Ethel McCann presided at the organ.

## MRS. EDDY OWNS A COOL MILLION

But Funds of the Christian Science Church Exceed \$12,000,000.

Boston, March 5.—While lawyers say Mrs. Baker Eddy's personal fortune amounts to at least \$1,000,000 cash, which is in a Concord, N. H., bank, Stephen H. Chase, of Fall River, a retired banker, converted, as he says, when he was cured of blood poisoning, holds the purse strings of the Christian Science Church.

Alfred Farlow, spokesman of the church in Boston, says that these purse strings include a fund of between \$12,000,000 and \$13,000,000. Treasurer Chase makes no estimate, but says Farlow is generally correct in any statement he makes.

Mr. Chase has an office fitted up in his Fall River home, where he keeps two clerks constantly at work. He is a man of large executive capacity, and has been looked upon among the followers of Mrs. Eddy as a man whose services the church is fortunate to possess.

Treasurer Chase has put a large amount of his personal property in his wife's name. He denied with emphasis that he had ever deposited any of the church funds in his wife's name or that he had ever said that he had. Any statement to the contrary, he averred, was an error.

Confidence is felt by leaders of the church in the sagacity of their treasurer; they believe that he will not be found wanting in this time of anxiety. He is fully able to keep his own counsel, and he is an adept at parrying questions from those who seek information as to the millions of which he had control.

"What of it if Mrs. Eddy's son has entered suit against her?" said Treasurer Chase today. "Is that any reason why the mother church in Boston and the entire Christian Science fold should be dragged into it, too? I cannot see it in that light."

"In my eyes, it is nothing more than a personal matter between our beloved leader and her son. Mind you, we stand ready to furnish all the information necessary to the proper authorities, should the courts so rule. Let me say with emphasis that there is absolutely nothing to be uncovered or exposed. Everything is straight as a string. I am willing to have my accounts inspected any time. I made my last report last May."

"I repeat that everything is in most accurate form. All things pertaining to Mrs. Eddy and the church are there are no crooked lines in anything with which our church or our beloved leader are concerned. It is not true that I ever signed over any of the church funds in my wife's name. Such a report is preposterous. What authority would I have to do anything of the kind? I have personal property and funds in my wife's name."

"As Mr. Farlow says, Mrs. Eddy has always been generous to her son. I take this step unless there were outside influences. But what right have the public or the newspapers to pry into the affair? Why should the private business of a legitimate, honest, prosperous and universally respected society be dragged before the public gaze? And it won't be. Wait and see."

## CLERICALS AND VON BUELOW

Antagonism in Reichstag May Precipitate Another General Election.

Berlin, March 4.—A period of lively internal politics, which may result in another dissolving of the Reichstag next fall, is forecasted by experienced observers as a result of the breach between the government and the Catholic party has been widened, and, as the Government barely defeated the Socialists at the last election, it may be decided to make another effort to reduce the Opposition by defeating more Socialists.

Chancellor Von Buelow is endeavoring to form a Government majority in the Reichstag without the aid of the Clerical Centre, who are determined to embarrass the Government in order to reassert their former paramount position and thus compel the chancellor to form a working arrangement with them. The debates indicated a growing intensity of political feeling, which is extending to social relations. The members of the Center party, at a caucus, resolved not to leave their cards at the chancellor's residence, as has been customary, nor to attend his parliamentary reception. To accentuate their personal opposition, they have left cards at the houses of all the other ministers and are attending the latter's evening receptions.

Many of the higher clergy disapproved of the decisions of the Center party before the elections, but under the circumstances, to preserve intact the powerful church party, they are closing up their ranks and consolidating in support of it.

## BOARD HELD FOR WRECK

The New York Central Directors Must Face Charge.

New York, March 5.—The coroner's jury, which has been investigating the wreck of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company did not take all the necessary precautions to guard the passengers at the New York Central, and consequently, were culpably negligent, and that the responsibility for the existing condition seems to be divided between the construction and operating departments.

The coroner announced that he would hold the entire board of directors of the New York Central and also the president, and would parole them until tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, when he would accept bail. He declined to say what charge would be laid.

## SCHOOL FOR MAGISTRATES

Minor French Judges To Be Trained to Commit Fewer Errors.

Paris, March 4.—A school of magistrates has been started here in connection with the law courts, with every prospect that it will fill a long-felt want. It has been observed that minor judges, with limited experience, frequently make grievous errors on the side of leniency or severity, so that the criminals escape and the innocent suffer.

There are 90 pupils in this school. Some students are already magistrates of experience on the bench, who are anxious to know all there is to be learned about the detection of crime and the treatment of culprits according to modern scientific methods. Others in the class are younger aspirants for the magistracy, to whom it may have been hinted from higher quarters that this course in this school may help them qualify for the position.

Once a week the 90 gather to hear a lecture. The instructor may be an expert in criminology, who can both relate and enlighten them by describing the latest devices for committing or concealing predatory acts which have been discovered by the worldwide fraternity of the underworld. Sometimes the lecturer will be a lawyer, a physician, a banker or a savant who can relate peculiar tricks by which he has suffered loss or given other facts relating to crime and criminals of which his pursuit has made him cognizant.

There will be lectures on poisons, forgeries, adulterations, and even on hypnotism as applied by the lawbreaker to his ends. Bertillon, whose system of identification of criminals has been adopted in most civilized countries, will lecture on methods of judicial investigation, giving practical suggestions upon the art of cross-examination.

The magistrate who examines the newly-caught persons accused of a crime has the right under the French law to put him through a severe inquiry.

One of the lines of study will deal with all sorts of psychological calculations rendered to trap the prisoner into inculpatory admissions.

## GERMANY'S NAVY USELESS

Empire Couldn't Fight at Sea Before 1920—Ships Floating Coffins.

London, March 5.—The Berlin correspondent of the Express says that Germany dare not even think of fighting a naval war before 1929. This, he adds, is the verdict of the great German naval expert, Count Reventlow, on the country's much-vaunted fleet.

Count Reventlow has nothing but praise for the officers and men of the German navy, but he condemns many of the battleships as unseaworthy and obsolete. Seventeen German battleships which figure as formidable fighting units in all navy lists are floating coffins, the use of which in war would only mean the sacrifice of their gallant crews.

Count Reventlow gives the names of the seventeen ships which he includes in this class of floating coffins. He points out that the construction of new and more efficient battleships is proceeding so slowly that thirteen years will pass before Germany can contemplate the possibility of a naval war with equality.

The ships which Count Reventlow condemns are eight coast defense vessels, four ships of the Sachsen class, and the ships of the Oldenburg and Brandenburg classes. One Dreadnought, he declares, could face all these simultaneously and put them out of action without great difficulty.

## CLEANING UP 'FRISCO

Ten Thousand Citizens Spend Sunday Putting Streets in Order.

San Francisco, March 5.—About 2,000 men and 300 teams turned out Sunday and made a big success of the first public street cleaning on record.

More was done in ten hours by volunteers than had been done in the ten months since the city was taken over by the city fathers.

Business men shoveled dirt side by side with men in overalls who work every day at cleaning brick. The eagles from the Presidio sounded the call to work at 8 o'clock. The city had been districted and under good managers the work of sweeping the streets and carting away the dirt went along lively. Before noon it was clear that the wagons could not keep pace with the cleaners, and when work ended at night there were hundreds of loads of dirt which will have to be removed.

The street in front of police headquarters was cleaned expeditiously by prisoners who were arrested Saturday night for drunkenness. When they had swept the street clean they were allowed to go. Along Montgomery street, formerly one of the worst in the city for dirt, financiers, brokers and real estate men turned out with their full office force of clerks and soon had the thoroughfare well cleaned.

Thirty eating stations were established in various parts of the burned district and these were attended by prominent women who had volunteered to look after feeding the workers. Even cigars were handed out to all who worked. Take it all in all it was a unique experience in city cleaning, and its democracy recalled the days of the great calamity.

## PEER MAY WED ACTRESS

Lord Dalmeny, Son of Ex-Premier, May Take Phyllis Dare as Bride.

London, March 5.—When Lord Rosebery was asked this week by reporters for the society newspapers to say whether or not it was true that his son, Lord Dalmeny, was engaged to Phyllis Dare, a pretty young actress in musical comedy, he gave them an emphatic denial, adding:

"Lord Dalmeny does not even know her to speak of."

This example of paternal innocence has caused the broadest of smiles in the theatrical circles where Lord Dalmeny's infatuation has been patent for some time. The former premier's son is determined to marry Phyllis at all costs, according to common talk.

The young woman has recently withdrawn her name from all theatrical bills as a first step to her expected entrance into the chameleone circle of the peerage.

But Lord Dalmeny, who is broken in health, has sent his son for an indefinite stay at his Edinburgh seat, Dalmeny Castle, in order to keep the young man out of the way of temptation.

Dalmeny has long been noted as a devoted admirer of not one, but several musical comedy girls. He has also made himself conspicuous on the turf and in other sporting capacities. He is captain of England's premier cricket club.

Lord Rosebery was at one time anxious that his son should marry Miss Pauline Astor, but Lord Dalmeny's interests were centered elsewhere. Lord Rosebery cannot harm him by cutting him out of his will, for the son will inherit about \$15,000,000 anyhow, besides a famous and immensely valuable collection of paintings. Being thus independent, Dalmeny is expected to go his own way in making his marriage.
