## Intermediate Title Goes to Hamilton

Kitchener Wins Last Game by 3 to 1 Score, But Loses Out on Round in the O. H. A. Finals.

KITCHENER, March 9.—It was too much for Hamilton in the Ambitious City which played here tonight. The Kitchener team, which had won the championship for 1917, was defeated by a score of 3 to 1. The lead which they secured at home in the first period of the game, was the first time in the history of the O. H. A. that a Hamilton team has won an intermediate championship, and the 200 rosters who accompanied the team certainly celebrated the fact. There was no scoring in the first period, both teams doing their best to keep the puck up a steady bombardment on the visitors' goal, and Sloan was kept very busy, stopping numerous ones that looked like sure goals.

The second period opened with some rush plays, and Kargus connected the first shot, scoring in 1:20 on a rebound. At 5:20 Klahn picked up the puck in the middle of the ice and shot it through. 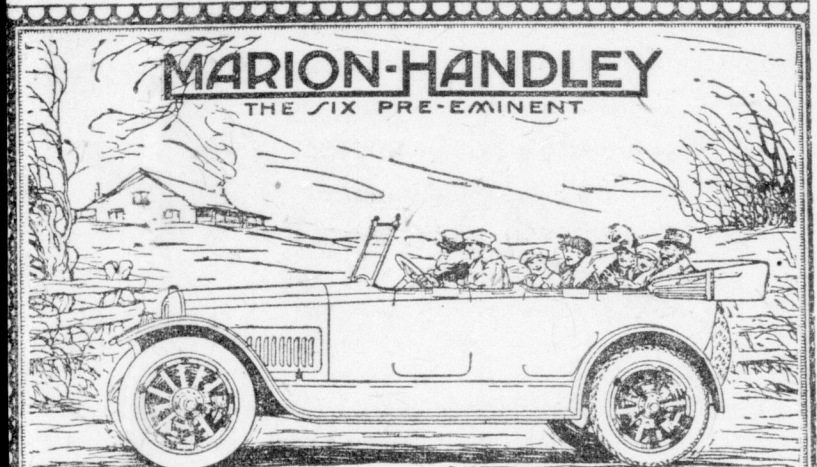

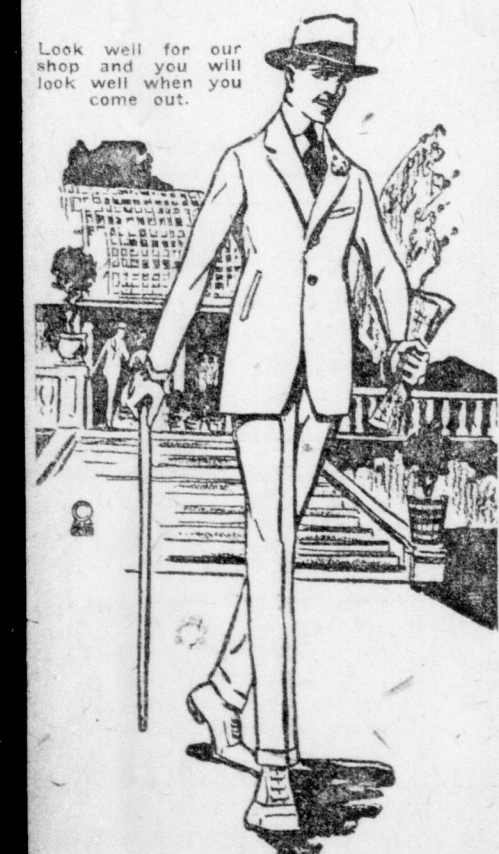

The remaining rounds were considerably snappier than the first half of the fight.

The soldier boy commenced to weaken in the last two rounds, and this section of the bout was favorable to Kelly.

## Sarnia Sailors Made Strong Bid for First Place, but Fell Down

Fans in the Imperial City Live d in Hopes That the Blue and White Would Duplicate Last Year's Trick.

SARNIA, March 8.—The closing chapters of the history of the 1915-17 Ontario Hockey Association are now being written, and in a few short weeks the word final will be written on the last page, and the book closed.

From the training camps of the various big league baseball clubs is now a sinning to filter into the sporting pages of the daily press and other athletic publications, and the hockey fans with its innumerable surprises and unexpected upsets will soon be a lingering memory in their minds.

The object of this article is two-fold, first to point out on their vagaries by a score of 12-4. On January 14 they grabbed off an exhibition contest from the last season's champions, and when they swooped down on London and scored a 9 to 7 victory over the 11th Battalion, the fans were borne out.

But alas, fate had a cruel blow in store for them, and in the return game with the 11th Battalion they were on the short end of a 10 to 6 score. The fans of the Sarnia Sailors, however, representing the 11th Battalion, invaded the arena of the locals on January 21 and carried away the long end of a 11-5 score.

As a diversion from the run of league contests, the Sailors took a trip to Detroit for a two-game series, held the City of the Straits to a tie, and a score of 2-2. With the exception of one game, the locals took a brace and walloped the 11th Battalion boys 13 to 3 in a contest in which all varieties of the great winter pastime were displayed. They followed this with a victory over the 14th Battalion squad in the N. H. L. series, again counting 13 to their opponents.

One of the two championships began to take on a rosy aspect. But pride goes before a fall, and in the return game with the 11th Battalion they were forced to again taste the cup of defeat in one of the most exciting and gruelling contests ever played in the London area, thus eliminating them from the intermediate O. H. A. series.

Their elimination from the senior series followed close upon, and they were given a severe lesson by the Preston septet on the home ice of the latter team by a score of 16-3. The hope of the locals now centred on the N. H. L. series, but these hopes were given a death blow in the first game with the Dunnville squad when they

scored but two goals to their opponents' ten.

That they would repeat their famous 1915 stunt, which brought them the championship over Belleville, of overcoming the big lead, was the thought of the fans, but they failed in the attempt, and although they copied the game from the visitors by a score of 3-2 they were five goals behind on the round. A shakeup occurred in the Sailors' lineup just prior to this game, and Flesch, Holman and Trigloof of the Detroit arena were, which was then in the throes of a strike, were secured to fill the breach in the locals' lineup, but although they made a commendable showing, they were unable to overcome the handicap which confronted them. In the interim previous to the series with Dunnville they scored a second victory over the Riverides, duplicating the score of the first contest, 7-6.

The junior aggregations in the city also failed to copy any glories, and were eliminated from the Northern League by the London tripe A's, and defaulted the O. H. A. series. Such were the records of the teams representing the Imperial City, and with the implements of the great winter pastime now relegated to the storeroom, prospects and proposals for next season are in order, not the least of which is the proposed erection of an artificial ice plant and arena, rumors of which have been prevalent for some time past.
