The application of the law to obligations of this sort is to prevent payments being made so that the money will reach Germany or other enemy countries, and help finance their military operations. Therefore the obligations due to British subjects, who may be so unfortunate as to be detained in Germany or other enemy be behind the German lines and under German control, will be taken care of as to custody of revenue, until war ends. Efforts have been made by Germans to transfer to companies in Holland, Denmark and Sweden, their title to Canadian securities so that interest and dividends may be transmitted to these countries and then sent on to Germany.
