INVALID PARTY OF SOLDIERS IS GIVEN WELCOME

27 Returned Men Who Left Halifax 24 Hours Before Disaster Reach London.

LONDONERS ARE INCLUDED

Despite Early Hour of Arrival Good Crowd Is On Hand To Greet Returning Heroes.

Despite the early hour of its arrival the party of twenty-seven returned soldiers which came in at the G. T. R. depot at 4:30 this morning was accorded an enthusiastic reception. A large crowd turned out to greet the returned boys who detrained at 8 o'clock after waiting in the cars for three hours. Officials of the Soldiers' Aid Committee, with the assistance of Mayor Stevenson, looked after the men in good shape. Sufficient motor cars for twice their number turned out to convey the boys to the Central Military Convalescent Hospital. Major Woods in charge of the troops, and a unit and band of the 1st Depot Battalion, Western Ontario Regiment, after welcoming the returned soldiers, led the parade of automobiles down Dundas street to the military hospital.

A number of men who had returned from the front, and a delegation of the Great War Veterans' Association also assisted in the welcome.

The returned men were unanimous in the opinion that Halifax and Toronto had extended them a magnificent reception Wednesday and Thursday. The soldiers left Halifax twenty-four hours before the terrible explosion. A banquet in honor of the returned boys was held at the military hospital.

Many Londoners as well as men from all parts of Ontario were included in the party. Several also claiming their home to be in the United States.

Pte. Edwards enlisted in England, but was sent to the 6th Battalion of Canadians. He had from Glasgow, Scotland, but was desirous of being sent to the 1st Depot Battalion, Western Ontario Regiment, the "once over" before deciding where to make his future residence.

"London looks pretty good to me," the Scot said, when asked where he intended to make his home.

Left With No. 3 Hospital. Corp. A. Jones, 3 Wyatt street, left this city with No. 3 Hospitalary Battalion, in the Dardanelles for eight months, in Egypt and Sicily for seventeen months before reaching his first wound. Corp. Jones stated the Dardanelles were pretty rough.

Pte. McKenna, 60 Bathurst street, left with the 15th Battalion, and was disabled after taking two trips to France.

Pte. R. F. Mayne, Woodworth avenue, St. Thomas, left Canada with the 1st Battalion. He was in the platoon of Lieut. Bart Cottam, and spoke in high terms of his officer, who was killed in action.

Another 18 Months of War. Corp. Mack H. Ayres, 33 Hume street, left this city with a 7th Field Company, Canadian Engineers' unit. He said that the boys "over there" expected the war to last at least one year and a half more, but were confident of ultimate victory.

Pte. D. J. Fry, 27 Beatrice street, and Corp. Charles Irvine, Central avenue, accompanied the party.

Sergeant C. May, quartermaster sergeant of the 15th Battalion, was too old to go to France, but did some good work in England until made convalescent through an injury to his knee.

Driver T. H. Pitt, 222 St. George street, left with the 15th Battalion, but failed to get to France owing to injuries he sustained in the Dardanelles.

Lucky Mistake. Corp. G. A. Pearson, 25 Grove street, Guelph, went overseas with the 1st Battalion. He was placed upon the list of men to return to Canada last Monday by mistake, or he would have come to Canada on one of the boats which arrived in Halifax at the time of the explosion.

W. H. Hesse, Preston, Ont., left for France at the beginning of the war. His father and grandfather were both German, but his Teutonic blood in Pte. Hesse's veins failed to hold him back when the call of duty urged him to France.

Sergeant Harvey Douglas of Woodstock was enthusiastic regarding the treatment accorded Canadian soldiers in England. "They treated us all like princes," he said.

Light Heart Salvation.

Decides On This Action If Mayor Does Not Sign Checks.

PARSIMONY CAUSES DEATH

Chairman Declares Lack of Appropriation for Assistant M. O. H. to Blame.

Owing to the refusal of Mayor H. A. Stevenson to sign a check for \$700, which represents the amount of an overdraft of the estimates of the board of health caused by the smallpox epidemic it was decided Thursday at a special meeting of the board to sue the city for the required amount unless the check is signed by Tuesday next.

The board of health has nine unpaid accounts totalling \$247.16. These will remain unpaid unless the mayor decides to sign the \$700 check.

In reading the resolution regarding the issuing of a writ for payment of the sum, Jeffrey Hale declared that the board was in its rights, demanding that the check be signed. The creditors of the board are: J. Cunliffe, \$26; Dr. C. Harris, \$37.50; Dr. A. A. McLean, \$71.75; Dr. S. J. Bean, \$18.45; Cairncross & Lawrence, \$3.65; National Drug Company, \$12.81; and the garbage department.

Chairman C. R. Somerville expressed regret that the board of health was unable to secure the services of a medical man to do full time work in connection with the prevention and alleviation of epidemics, owing to the small salary decided upon by the city council. He said that a great deal of sickness and some deaths would have been prevented by an assistant appointed at the beginning of the year to give his whole time to the work.

A resolution was passed authorizing the chairman and M. O. H. to take action to have \$1,500 which was taken by the city council from the board of health reserved for the use of the smallpox hospital. Fifteen hundred dollars was reserved for the use of the smallpox hospital in connection with the smallpox epidemic. The board of health decided that the sum should not be used for any other purpose than that for which it was originally intended, and passed a resolution that it should be repaid.

It was decided to arrange for a commission of the provincial board of health to investigate the affairs of the London Board of Health.

The services of a solicitor will be engaged to carry out the wishes of the board relating to the collection of accounts passed by the board.

BRANDS STORIES OF IMMORALITY AMONG SOLDIERS UNTRUE

"Y" Worker Tells Canadian Club of Falsity.

There are horrible rumors here concerning the immorality of our boys at the front. Believe me when I say, after all my experience with the soldiers in England and in France, that there is practically no truth whatsoever in these rumors; that there is nothing for the mothers of Canada to be anxious about. It is true that in such a large army as ours there are bound to be some men of low morals. But in regard to the great majority of the men there is no truth in the rumors whatsoever. I believe that they are entirely of German origin."

Such was the statement made by Alexander Watson in the course of an address at the Women's Canadian Club yesterday afternoon.
