Yet even the state can provide for saving in only two ways: taxation and giving in wages less than the total produced; that is, it will either take away peoples' earnings as taxes, or it will hold back at the source a part of the product. If, moreover, as is often recommended, the amount of taxes, or withholding of earnings, is so large from those who produce most that it brings them nearly to an equality with those who produce least, people will have no inducement to take highly-paid positions. They will not by study or training or care qualify themselves for high-paid positions. They will look for comfortable work, easily learned, at merely comfortable pay; for they will be no better off in better jobs.
