LIGHT CROPS CAUSE **FAMINE SWEEP OVER CHINESE PROVINCES**

ens 20,000,000 Unless Help Comes.

PEKING, Nov. 1.—(By the Associated Four Million Gallons Per Day Press).-Famine conditions in Chihli. Shansi, Shantung and Honan provinces, due to repeated light crops, followed by almost complete failure this summer are reported by investigators to be the worst in years. It is estimated that 20,000,000 people are in peril of death from starvation and disease during the coming winter unless help on a large scale is afforded. Thousands of families are already afoot making their way northward in the hope of finding food and employment. Others are selling their belongings piecemeal to procure food at greatly-advanced prices. cure food at greatly-advanced prices. Farm and draught animals are being disposed of for a song for lack of fodder to keep them and fuel to cook them if slaughtered.



Death by Starvation Threat- LOTS OF SULPHUR WATER UNDER CITY

If Purified Could Be Used.

Preliminary reports on the possibility of using sulphur water to augment the city's drinking supply may be available for the public utilities commission when it meets Friday afternoon. According to present opinions at least four million gallons could be obtained from this source. Large supplies of this kind of water are said to be available 150 feet below the surface of any part of London.

The quantity available cannot be estimated as it has never been pumped. The pressure has been sufficient to force it to ground level in any shafts that have been sunk without the need of artificial help. In fact at the foot of Dundas street a flowing well had to be capped and controlled by a valve because the pressure was so great.

According to General Manager E. V. Buchanan, there are good prospects of purifying the water as it has been successfully accomplished at Dayton, Fla. Purification is accomplished by taking the water to the top of a tower and flowing it down ripple like steps of an artificial cascade.
