Jacob Schaefer, who died at Denver on Tuesday, was by many considered the greatest billiard player in the history of the game. He repeatedly held the world's champlonship at 18.1 and 18.2 balk-line billiards. He was particularly noted for his gameness and nerve, and it was a common saying that he never was defeated until his apponent had run out the last point of his string. He was born in Milwaukee in 1855. Soon after this his family moved to Leavenworth, Kas., where he learned the game of billiards. His stepfather, named Berg, kept a billiard hail, and it was there Schaefer learned the rudiments of the game, Mr. Schaefer left Chicago about two years ago to go to Denver for his health, Shortly before he left he won the 18.1 championship from Willie Hoppe.

The great cue master first came into prominence in 1878, when he won a tournament in St. Louis.
