duarter-section of available Dollmini land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lanus Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lanus Agency (out not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within mine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
