ALLIED GENERALS ASSIST ROUMANIA

General Berthelot Disposes Command in Most Skilful Manner.

DOBRUDJA LINE STRONG

Mackensen Halts Before Ridge Four Miles From Danube.

London, Nov. 3.—A Bucharest despatch says that Major-Gen. Berthelot has disposed his high Roumanian command in a manner believed to be most effective against the highly organized German machine with which Field Marshals Von Falkenhayn and Von Mackensen seek to destroy

Roumania. Russia's latest contribution to the Roumanian staff is Lieut.-Gen. Vladi-mir Sakharoff, one of the most bril-liant strategists in all the czar's armies. He has arrived in Bucharest and will forthwith take command of the army of Russians, Roumanians and Serbs that had to retreat before Von

Mackensen in Dobrudja.

Gen. Bialayev, another distinguished Russian, has been assigned to the passes of the lower Carpathians. Gen. Iliesco, who organized the Roumanian armies prior to their entry into the war, probably will be responsible for the Wallachian front.

The entente's devices for handling Field Marshal Von Mackensen already have shown signs of maturity.
The retreat in the Dobrudja, which ended more than a week ago, has been transformed into an offensive. Official reports from Bucharest and Petrograd gay that along the whole front from say that along the whole front from the Danube to the sea, his efforts have been worked forward, and are keeping

the Teutons busy.
