


In the World of Sport.

WARD SYSTEM BILL PASSES THE HOUSE

St. John Will Try It for Two Years and Plebiscite Will be Held in 1908—Premier Pugsley's Suggestion as to Fredericton Sewerage Matter.

Fredericton, March 27—In the legislature this evening the bill respecting civic elections in the city of St. John was discussed in committee and agreed to with a section added providing that the common council of the city should take a vote of the electors at the same time as the civic elections of the year 1908 on the following questions:

SON OF PETER H. MILLS IS A MAINE SENATOR

Romantic Story of a Nova Scotian Who Went to West Deer Isle on the Maine Coast Many Years Ago.

(Portland Express.) The breaking waves dashed high on the stern and rock bound coast of Maine when Peter H. Mills, a native of that part of the Dominion of Canada, then called Nova Scotia, landed from a sailing vessel at the little village of West Deer Isle, and went ashore to look for a home.
