Paris, May 12—Six assaults by the Germans on the French lines have been repulsed with heavy losses, according to an official statement issued by the French war office today. Three attacks were made north of Moulin-De-Laffaux and three northeast of Braye-En-Laonnois. ITALIAN GAIRS ADMITTED

London, May 7-An official statement issued by the Austrian war office on Wednesday admits gains for the Italians in the fighting on the Isonzo, but claims the repulse of the majority of the attacks and a total capture of 2,000 soldiers.
