Sherman C. Swift, superintendent of the Library for the Blind in Toronto,

announces that he expects in a few weeks time to have a printing machine installed for the making of books in Braille, the blind man's "finger-type," and later to develop this branch of work by adding binding and finishing rooms.

In these work rooms it is his intention to employ blinded soldiers who return to Canada from the war. The only difficulty which a man whose sight is gone experiences in binding a book is

gone experiences in binding a book is his need to know the placing of the sec-

tions, and were these sections printed in Braille, a print which he sees readily with his finger tips, he would have no difficulty at all.
