Y.M.C.A. SUGGESTS
"OVERSEAS" GIFTS

Overseas Department Gives Lists of Timely Christmas Gifts

With the approach of Christmas, when so many Canadian families are anxious to send friends in the trenches presents that will be most acceptable, the Y. M. C. A. Overseas Department has issued a list of suggested articles that may serve as a guide.

The list follows:—

- 1.—Goods to wear (in order of importance):—
 - (a) Socks in large quantities. Greatest need of all.
 - (b) Gloves. Woolen gloves are good, but a light leather glove is very satisfactory, especially if large enough to wear over a woolen glove.
 - (c) Balbriggan hankies.
 - (d) Light sweaters to be worn under tunic. Such a sweater is issued by the army, but soon after the winter issue many men are found without them.
 - (e) Handkerchiefs.
- 2.—Goods to eat and drink:—
 - (a) Home-made candies, which will keep, such as toffee, fudge, etc., in small packets.
 - (b) Cakes, home-made if possible, and fruit cake by preference.
 - (c) Cocoa, in quarter pound cans, safe as ball, are the most acceptable gifts in the drink line.
- 3.—Equipment:—
 - (a) Tommy cooker—one of the finest things. Keeps in plenty.
 - (b) Candles—in unlimited quantities. During winter issue candles are scarce and candles are often more acceptable than food.
 - (c) A correspondence wallet to fit the pocket and in which paper to fit could be placed.
 - (d) Pencils—short, indelible, of good quality; otherwise regular lead pencils.
 - (e) Ink pellets for fountain pens.

(f) Light woollen underclothing would make a most useful gift.

RES FORES SIGHT
One-Eyed Soldier Who Blinded Himself With Awl Sees Again

Private G. Taylor, a plucky young one-eyed soldier who so unfortunately pierced his good eye with an awl a few weeks ago, and as a result became totally blind, has been restored to the Queen's Military Convalescent Hospital at Kingston, and is able to see again.

The plight of the young man excited great sympathy. He tried to enlist in an infantry battalion, but was turned down because he had only one eye. Determined to serve his country he sought a place in the railway construction corps and was accepted. Illness necessitated his being sent home from this service, and the accident happened while he was endeavoring to mend his army boots.

Careful nursing and the attention of the eye specialist at the Military Hospital saved his sight.

BLINDED CANADIAN
HEROES SUCCEEDING

Blind Sergeant-Major Middlemiss Writes of Success of St. Dunstan's Courses in Suitable Occupations

Sergeant-Major Robert Middlemiss of the King's Own Scottish Borderers, through whose blind eyes thousands of Americans caught their first glimpse of the awful realities of war, when he circled the states on a lecture tour in the early spring, has been taking a course in poultry raising at St. Dunstan's school for the blind, where the blinded heroes of all the empire's forces are re-educated for civil life, and will soon go on a little farm of his own.

The majority of the thirty-one Canadians who have been blinded in the war, the only class of disabled soldiers not cared for in Canada by the Military Hospitals Commission, are there with him taking various courses determined by their abilities and interests, and in a letter which he typed himself he tells of their progress. They are all doing well, he declares, and those who have been trained and are now settled at work in various occupations they were taught in the school are very successful.

Harry Turner, a Canadian newspaper man who was blinded in the war and retained at St. Dunstan's, is now working on a Saskatoon paper; others are masseurs, lawyers, stenographers, dictaphone operators, and insurance men.

Sherman C. Swift, superintendent of the Library for the Blind in Toronto, announces that he expects in a few weeks time to have a printing machine installed for the making of books in Braille, the blind man's "fingertype," and later to develop this branch of work by adding blind and finishing rooms.

In these work rooms it is his intention to employ blinded soldiers who return to Canada from the war. The only difficulty which a man whose sight is gone experiences in finding a book is his need to know the placing of the sections, and were these sections printed in Braille, a print which he sees readily with his finger tips, he would have no difficulty at all.

Occupations as interesting for the blind are not numerous, and such a boon to the blinded soldiers will be welcomed by those who are busy at the present time re-educating them, and bringing them in touch with the world which they lose when sight leaves them.

The books of the library are circulated in all parts of the dominion, and in the last quarter records show that 2046 volumes were drawn.
