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TEMPERANCE LECTURE FROM BENCH TODAY

Presence of Number of Young Men in Police Court on Drunkenness Charge Calls for Remarks from Judge

Eight prisoners faced Judge Ritchie this morning in the police court, drunkenness being the main cause of their presence on the bench.

"A good many of the old-timers," said His Honor, "have met in the streets about the city or province and let me tell you that if you do not put a check to your wrongdoing, I am afraid you will come to an awful end."

James Peck, Thomas Moore and Alec Brown were fined \$5 or two months each on charges of drunkenness.

Terrence White was fined \$24 or three months in jail on a charge of being drunk and \$10 on a charge of resisting the police.

Two young fellows, Stanley Colwell and John Stephens, having promised the judge to refrain from liquor of all kinds until they were thirty years of age, were ordered to go to the police station.

Robert McKee was remanded on a charge of escaping from the Boys' Industrial home on May 17. He will be given a preliminary hearing before being sent to trial.

A fine of \$2 was struck against Fred Clarke, reported by Police Constable Marshall for driving across the sidewalk in Broad street.
