

SAINT JOHN CUTS MONCTON'S LEAD DOWN TO TWO CLEAR GAMES

LANE STARS IN BRILLIANT WIN OVER SUSSEX

Crucial Test Carded For Here On Monday Night

TAKING liberties with Tennyson's "Six Hundred," one could say that Saint John crept "half a game, half a game, half a game" in the most brilliant exhibition of hockey of the year last evening when they collared a lightninglike match from the Sussex Colts at the Arena, 6 to 2. Before the game started, the locals were two and a half games behind Moncton, but when the wreckage had been cleared away and the locals won, the half game was wiped off, and the Saint John boys go into Monday night's game just two games behind the Sussex leaders.

That two-game lead looks big now, with only four more games for each team. Each team plays two more home games and two more away games with each other, and the locals must grab every one of them to get out in front. If Moncton wins here on Monday night, they have only to win one out of three to capture the honors. Should Saint John win, their work would be cut out for them to nose out the locals. A great deal hinges on Monday's game, and the locals are out to give their best.

LANE STARS. Easily the outstanding man on the ice last night was Temple Lane. Every game that Saint John fans see this boy in action only increases the hold he has on them, and it was a treat to see the wonderfully fast manner in which he moved last night over the ice. He scored the first goal on a brilliant bit of work with Brad Gilbert, and he turned right around from the face-off and duplicated their performance, Gilbert poking the puck in while the crowd went wild. Barely had they settled in their seats when Lane, by a dazzling piece of work, made it 2 to 1 for the locals. He scored again on a brilliant shot in the second period, Bourdreaux getting two more in this period, making it 6 to 1 when the locals trouped on the ice for the final period.

Brad Gilbert's brilliant tactics bothered the Sussex defence throughout the game, the veteran never turning in a better game than last night. He broke up a dozen rushes, and once in the final period, when the entire Sussex team was assaulting the local defence, Brad broke through with the two entire teams at his heels and clear ice between him and Roach. Sussex managed to deflect his shot, but it was a close shave at that.

Everyone of the locals worked hard through every minute of the game, determined not to be caught napping as they did in their last game with Sussex, when the visitors rushed them off their feet in the opening periods. Bourdreaux improved with every game, while Hallisey, Kiley and Thompson were all over the ice. Jimmy Mountain showed up well as sub wing man, while McPhee made several great stops. Rathburn was on for a few minutes as relief defence. For Sussex, Harold Radcliffe, Percy Radcliffe and Johnny Friars started. Harold was always a threat, and the rushes of Percy and Friars were laden with goal-scoring possibilities.

The third period was productive of very ragged hockey for the first ten minutes, after which Sussex tightened and made a determined effort to tie up the score. Harold Radcliffe made a pass from behind the net and beat McPhee for Sussex's second tally. The score was disputed as it looked very much as if the puck had hit the front of the goal post, but Referee McLeod upheld the judge's decision.

A few minutes later P. Radcliffe skated through the local defence and hit McPhee's pads with a shot. The latter batted the puck straight out to H. Radcliffe, who made another for Sussex on a cleverly placed shot to the corner of the net. The visiting sextette then put five men on the forward line and gave the local net-minder a busy time without further result. Roach in the Sussex goal played a wonderful game in this period. The game ended 6 to 2 in favor of the locals.

For Saint John, Lane, Bourdreaux and Gilbert played brilliant hockey, while the Radcliffe boys and J. Friars showed up as best for Sussex.

Along The Sport Trail

TWO MORE DAYS remain before the starter's pistol splits the air at Lily Lake for the opening of the world's championship speed-skating meet and with all arrangements completed only an even break with the weather man is needed and skating history will be made for years to come. Tomorrow and Monday, the influx of skaters and visitors from all parts of Canada and the United States sets in in earnest and by nightfall on Monday, old King Skating will reign supreme. The spectacle that will be presented on the three days of next week to the sport-loving people of Saint John is the realization of a vision caught and held a few years ago by men who have the interest of the game here at heart and it speaks volumes for their energy and foresight in that over that long period of waiting they never faltered or stopped but marched steadily to their goal until it has been reached. The bringing of Clas Thunberg from far-off Finland has given the game here a tremendous impetus that will last for many years to come. It will form the theme of many a sport debate and it will create a tremendous interest among our juniors. Any city that has 800 or her young manhood skating daily and racing nearly every week has not got much to fear of the future in this line of sport. It is wonderfully healthy exercise for them and it helps the city. A city without a sporting interest is dead from the heels up because sport will lift a town right out of the rut. The bigger the sport, the bigger the lift. Saint John sure is getting one next week.

THREE CLASSY HOCKEY GAMES are carded for next week with Moncton, Halifax and Sussex as visitors. The menu could hardly be better for the world's championship meet. That's going to be a real game Monday night against Moncton.

SOME LIGHT has flooded at last on Jack Dempsey's next appearance in the ring to defend his million-dollar title and coming as it does from the tower of Madison Square Garden and directed by our friend Tex Rickard, it attracts much attention. Rickard has declined to be drawn into any discussion of the details but that is Rickard's own way of securing some much-needed publicity for the coming match. He says he will announce it in a few days and in the meantime the reporters will scurry around and try to ferret out the details. The boys will run into the Rickard-Tunney fight, they'll ask them what is going on the Rickard-Tunney fight, they'll say "nothing doing" and he'll say "write a column on it, anyway." Getting back to the Dempsey-Tunney affair, it is said this will be the only one for the champion this year and that it will be held late in August. What attitude the State Athletic Commission will take on the subject of a Dempsey-Tunney match is problematical. The commission has placed Dempsey on the ineligible list for his refusal to accept a bout with Willis, and Dempsey still is ineligible. The commission's rules forbid a licensed promoter in this State from carrying on negotiations with an ineligible boxer. Whether the rule can be applied to a promoter licensed here but negotiating for a bout in a different State, is open to discussion. It is felt that Rickard can safely negotiate with Dempsey for a bout in New Jersey without jeopardizing his license as a promoter in this State. The plans for a fight with Tunney and Jack Sharkey or some other heavyweight in the Garden in March. It is reported that in the title bout contract will be inserted the customary clause forbidding the parties to the contract from engaging in a previous bout prior to the date of the championship battle.

THOSE PITTSBURGH PIRATES sure are piling points these days in the N. H. L. race. They meet the Maroons tonight.

YESTERDAY, we received the following from Charlie Gorman's brother, Ansonia, Conn., who saw Charlie skate for the first time at Madison Square Garden. He gives great praise to Walter Golding, special representative of the skating association. He says:

"I am taking the liberty of addressing you regarding a few impressions of my recent visit to New York where I saw Charlie skate and also met Mr. Golding. It would please me very much if you would let the public know a few of the facts about him while in New York. The first will be a conversation between Charlie and I in which he told me Mr. Golding was the best adviser he ever had been on a trip with. You can't make that too strong. The second was his wonderful work regarding the meet in Saint John and getting some great advertising for it. He was on the hop from early morning until late at night and he certainly did great work for the Saint John Skating Association. They could not have picked a better man. In addition, he worked hard to help the Finns there. To my own knowledge, he had to cancel reservations three times. In my opinion, he ran around too much for them. It was my pleasure to see Charlie skate, it being the first time. He was very much elated with his style, having seen most of the old timers skate on the Victoria Rink back home. I hope the meet will be a huge success and I hope the world's title will stay in Saint John."

COMMISSION BANS RICKARD'S PLANS

Members Say They Will Not Sanction at Dempsey-Tunney Bout

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Impending fistio war with Tex Rickard over reported negotiations by the promoter for a Jack Dempsey-Gene Tunney heavyweight title fight, today turned the state athletic commission to press and public for support of its policies.

The officials would never sanction the proposed Tunney fight until Dempsey has obeyed the commission's edict to defend his crown against Willis first. Commissioner Wm. Muldoon asked that newspapers and sportsmen lend their assistance to the commission's attempts to compel champions and prominent boxers to fight leading rivals at reasonable terms. Not only does the commission frown on a Dempsey-Tunney bout, but it demands that Tunney fulfill his promise to fight "a suitable heavyweight in the Garden" on or before March 15.

Meanwhile, if Rickard negotiates or signs Dempsey or Tunney, he will find himself "in hot water" is the forecast of Chairman Farley.

Turro Continues to Win Over Boston Hockey Teams

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Jan. 22.—Winning their fourth successive victory over the Crystals of Summerside, the Charlottetown Abegweits hockey team by a score of 6 to 1 took the Prince Edward Island amateur title here tonight and won the right to participate in the semi-final for the Maritime amateur hockey championship.

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 22.—(Associated Press)—The Turro Hockey Club defeated the Boston Athletic Association by a score of 2 to 1 tonight in one of the best exhibitions of hockey ever given here by a team from Nova Scotia. It was the second victory of the Nova Scotia invaders over Boston teams, Turro having previously vanquished the strong Boston team.

N. H. L. GAMES. MONTREAL, Jan. 23.—Cooper Smeaton has been named by President Calder to referee the Montreal-Pittsburgh National Hockey League fixture at the Forum tonight. Smeaton will handle the game alone. Games tonight mark the half way mark in the league race. Should the Maroons win, they will be within one game of Toronto, lost, the second half will start with Ottawa well in front, and Montreal holding strongly to second position.

But a reverse for the Maroons tonight, while still leaving them in second place, will mean that they will have to fight the hardest to hang on their position in the campaign and assure them of a play off berth. Boston and New York will fight it out at Madison Square Garden. Ottawa draws the bye tonight.

Billy Coutt will definitely not be allowed to play for Canadiens at Toronto tonight, according to President Frank Calder, who has the case of the Canadian captain in his hands, following the automatic suspension of the defenseman when he was awarded a match penalty for tripping Referee Lafamme last Tuesday night at the Arena. Just how long Coutt will be out of harness will not be known until the league head has fully investigated both sides of the tripping episode.

TIE GAME. VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 23.—Last night's Western Hockey League game on local ice between Seakoot and Victoria ended in a tie, one goal each. For nearly fifty minutes the teams battled without a count. The Cougars scored first in 7:40, after the third period opened. A little more than ten minutes later, the Seakoots equalized. The game went into a tie and ten minutes overtime was not productive scoring.

MOVIE STARS GIVE SKATES FOR MEET

Four pairs of famous speed skates with racing boots, the prize gift of Milton Sills, Norma Talmage, Corinne Griffith and Richard Barthelmess, moving picture stars of universal renown, have been offered the Saint John Amateur Skating Association, as supplementary prizes for any events selected by the racing committee. This information was communicated to the Association through Manager Harry T. Long, of the First National Pictures Inc., of the Maritime branch in this city.

The vague of ice skating sweeping the colder zones of United States and Canada, has brought to the Saint John movie stars of athletic inclination. Mr. Sills, it is said, maintains a private rink of artificial ice near his Hollywood bungalow. He is, he says, greatly interested in the skating of the First National Corporation to bring about this prize offer. Since Saint John is holding the world's skating classic next week, naturally attention was directed towards us here, and the prize skates are therefore being offered for the big occasion.

PERSONALLY ENGRAVED. Each pair of skates will bear a facsimile of the donor's autograph. It will be engraved on the Saint John Association's program for the occasion and the engraved memento of the occasion will be given to the skater who is a member of the Association's special committee to decide. There is a probability they will be given for the junior events, boys and girls, as an incentive to the new crop of flyers. Presentation of the gift skates may be made in a local theatre, as the gracious bestowal emanates from moving picture sources and personalities.

Last night, the skaters in town were given their envelopes containing a letter of welcome and passes to various local places of entertainment.

CLAS GIVES THANKS. Mr. Thunberg wanted to publicly express his deep gratitude for the heartening welcome he has received since reaching Saint John and for that matter from the time he left New York in charge of the homebound Canadian delegation. He said it was not necessary for him to hear his native tongue spoken to sense the cordiality of the greeting given him on all sides. All he needs to do is to see the kindly light in the eyes of the Canadians, observe their friendly mien and bask in the sunshine of their smiles.

The visiting Finn is a thoughtful man. He is seeing for himself what an occasional Canadian immigration missionary tells the folks over there about this country and its people. In his quaint way he relates how the Scandinavian people have had glowing pictures of Canada placed before them. Now he sees it for himself. However, Thunberg has no intention of leaving his native land. Clas is a married man, settled in his habits and enjoys the company of family people. He says Nunavut is going to return to the United States next spring and live in Los Angeles.

He was over here to be faithful to his trust as champion, to skate cleanly and fairly and win or lose he would do so.
