The commission "has placed Dempsey on the ineligible list for his refusal to accept a bout with Wills, and Dempsey still is ineligible. The commission's rules forbid a licensed promoter in this State from carrying on negotiations with an ineligible boxer. Whether the rule can be applied to a promoter licensed here but negotiating for a bout in a different State, is open to discussion.
