

PROGRESSIVE STEP TAKEN TO BOOST N. B. ADVANTAGES

Provincial Tourist Association, At Adjourned Session, Decides To Appoint Manager For Organization of Publicity and Development Campaign

Association Will Co-operate to Full Extent With Local and Federal Governments in Protection of Fishing Privileges

NOTICE of a motion to change the constitution so that the secretary-treasurer will be appointed by the executive and not elected at the annual meeting; the unanimous adopting of the report of the special committee which included the appointment of a manager of the association; a protest from the Woodstock Board of Trade that Woodstock was getting too little publicity from the association compared with the rest of the province; and the introduction of a resolution that the association offer the Government the fullest co-operation in carrying out the protection of the fishing privileges; were among the features of the concluding session of the annual meeting of New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association, postponed from Feb. 12, which was held in the offices of the Association, in Germain street, yesterday afternoon. Dr. G. A. B. Addy was elected president for the ensuing year.

In the absence of the president, G. Bruce Burpee was elected chairman. A letter was read from H. P. Robinson, the president, tendering his resignation and expressing his regret that on account of business reasons he was unable to permit his name to come up for nomination again this year.

RESOLUTION RECEIVED.
George Gilbert, K.C., of Bathurst, introduced a resolution with reference to the fishing leases of the province and this was received by the secretary. It was also decided to have the incoming executive appoint a committee to confer with the Fish and Game Association on the resolution and report back.

TO APPOINT MANAGER.
The report of the special committee submitted at the previous session was adopted in full. This included the appointing of a manager whose duties will be the complete organization of the province as outlined at a previous session, and whose entire time will be devoted to exploiting the natural advantages and making a complete inventory of the tourist attractions in every section of the province.

The notice to amend the constitution to permit the executive to choose the secretary-treasurer in the future was not taken up, as the secretary-treasurer was not present. The other officers were given and the matter will be taken up at the next regular meeting.

WOODSTOCK PROTEST.
R. W. Maxwell, of Woodstock, said that he had been delegated by the Board of Trade, of which he was secretary, to inform the meeting that since the last annual meeting there had been a growing feeling that too little publicity was being given other places in comparison with Saint John. He declared that this feeling was growing not only in Woodstock, but throughout the Saint John River Valley. He claimed that derogatory references had been made to some of the hotels in that vicinity at the last meeting of the association. He also said that references were made to the road between Saint John and St. Stephen, and it was remarked that unless certain repairs were made tourists would enter the province via Houlton and Woodstock. He said that the people around Woodstock resented such statements and he pointed out that good support had been received from that section and intimated that unless better co-operation was received the association might find itself minus that support in the future.

C. B. Allan, secretary, said that he, with others, had personally investigated complaints regarding hotels in the vicinity of Woodstock. He told of an incident where an American tourist had, on finding that he was unable to secure a room with a bath in the hotel, only stayed overnight, and then only when forced to do so on learning that he could not reach Quebec that night. The party had left bright and early next day for Quebec when they had intended to stay in this province. All because of the hotel accommodations, he said. He added, however, that a few of the hotels in the section were comparatively good, and he understood that others were making improvements.

Mr. Maxwell suggested that the association link up with the State of Maine Publicity Bureau. However, it was pointed out that it was difficult to work harmoniously where the sections were in different countries. The matter of the expense was also a handicap, it was declared.

It was suggested to Mr. Maxwell that a committee be organized at Woodstock and other places in the province with representation on the central committee at Saint John and they list every attraction in their own section, including fishing, shooting, boating, hotel accommodations, drives, etc., and have them ready to hand tourists when asked by the latter for entertainment.

AN APPRECIATION.
The members of the association unanimously passed a resolution of appreciation to C. B. Allan who is retiring from the secretary-treasurer after serving faithfully in that capacity for a number of years. The resolution also expressed the regret at his leaving the office and expressed the hope that he would continue to lend his untiring support to the association. Several members paid a personal tribute to the worth of the retiring secretary.

Mr. Allan expressed his thanks briefly. He said he had been interested in the work and felt it was important to the province. He felt that the association had done good work under the handicaps of lack of funds and appreciation. He paid a tribute to the executive who for 25 years had kept it going, helped along by the expenditure of their own time and money. He wished the incoming executive every success.

Officers chosen for the ensuing year were as follows:
President, Dr. G. A. B. Addy; acting secretary, W. E. Anderson; auditor, T. F. Drummond; members of the executive, J. G. Harrison, W. G. Allison,

and use of explosives, are posted up at or near to the streams, lakes and rivers, or roads leading thereto.
2. It is advisable that fishing privileges owned by the province, be leased, subject to conditions requiring the keeping of sufficient guards, by the lessees, unless adequate protection can be otherwise provided.
3. In leases of fishing privileges owned by the province, (particularly of easily accessible fishing) some provision be made whereby some portions of the leased privileges, may be reserved for leasing for daily periods, to any applicants either by the lessee or Crown Land Department, or be kept open for use by the public without compensation, but that such reserved portions shall nevertheless be under the other convenient place in the several counties where the fishing is obtainable.
4. It is desirable, that easily accessible records be compiled and kept by this association (if possible in co-operation with the Crown Land Department) of fishing obtainable for daily or other short periods on both public and privately owned water, and also, of places on our sea shores, where deep sea fishing may be had, with names and addresses of persons from whom such fishing can be procured or for such fishing.
5. Daily fishing licenses should be obtainable by non-residents, at lower rates than the licenses now issued, to state the day for which the same is issued, and that such licenses should be procurable in the shire towns or other convenient place in the several counties where the fishing is obtainable.
6. That this association co-operate, in the fullest possible manner, with the Honourable the Minister of Lands and Mines, and his department, to bring about the greatest possible protection, and most extensive enjoyment of our fishing privileges.
7. That this association endeavour to procure the assistance of the Department of Marine and Fisheries of Canada, in the re-stocking of any public or privately owned waters, where it is deemed possible to create or improve new or presently existing fishing privileges.
Therefore resolved, that a committee be appointed with instructions to confer with the Honourable the Minister of Lands and Mines, touching all matters herein referred to, with authority to act, and to offer the fullest co-operation of this association in the carrying out of any laws, regulations or agreements which may be made for the fullest protection and enjoyment of our fishing privileges.
Further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Honourable the Minister of Lands and Mines, with a request for a conference with our committee, with a view to the consideration of the matters herein referred to, and also in connection with any matters deemed to be for the benefit of our fisheries, and for the promotion of the objects of this association.

UPPER SACKVILLE FIRE

SACKVILLE, Feb. 25.—There was a slight fire in the barn of George Fullerton, Upper Sackville, Tuesday morning. It appears that a blow torch used to thaw out a water pipe

set fire to some sawdust packed around the pipe, and later Mrs. Fullerton saw smoke coming from the ventilator in the barn.
