MAINLY QUESTIONS BEFORE COMMONS

Morning Sittings are Begun—Canteen Fund is Under Discussion.

Ottawa, July 14—Entering upon what supposedly is its last lap, Parliament today dealt with a diversity of things all of them interesting, a few of them highly controversial. Morning sittings began at eleven, the subject of the accumulated deficit. Primarily there was a long discussion about the Research Council Bill, whose amending purpose is to give the council the right to accept requests and to provide for a permanent salaried chairman. Heretofore it has been an honorary advisory committee of savants, mostly from the universities trying to devise ways and means of applying science to industrial and commercial uses. It has met with some success, there is a great deal of overlapping of different agencies aiming at the same objective.

One of the ideas behind the bill is to co-ordinate these different federal, provincial, and other activities and get them working on a harmonized basis, with the investigations into particular subjects specifically allocated. All that was said about the bill was favorable to the general idea but there were some peculiar suggestions as to how the subject might be handled. Mr. Gould, for example, thought that they might engage in some research and report on the feasibility of that much questioned route of navigation.

The next item that amounted to much was the Government's proposal to provide a pension for civil service commissioners who have served 15 years or who may become disabled before that. The bill provides that they get two-thirds salary. There was some sympathy of opposition but it was very superfluous, Mr. Shaw and Mr. Woods had it all their own way and they weren't very peppy at that.

Mr. Shaw's explanation was that the bill was a life appointee, thus differing from other Government commissions, and it is a question as to whether they come under the bill. Mr. Shaw was critical of the fact that the commission members themselves had asked for the bill which a committee of the House had recommended in the Government.

Conservatives did not say anything and as the resolution went through without much ado the bill based upon it will probably have the same fate.

A longer discussion took place on the canteen funds disposal, although much of it didn't have reference to the bill at all. Rather it was a process of plating with praise the soldiers' organizations, the great work they are doing and the great service to Canada and humanity their members did in the past. The canteen funds are an accumulation of the profits accruing from the operation of canteens overseas, soft stuff and other truck was on sale. Perhaps the most interesting proviso is that \$100,000 is to be set aside to a central board of three trustees to be used as they may deem fit for the maintenance and for the benefit of service men and their dependents. \$50,000 goes to the United Service Fund of Great Britain and \$50,000 to the American Red Cross to look after especially meritorious cases of Canadian former service men. Their list is to be divided among the provinces where provincial boards of trustees will assist.

Conservative directors meet. The directors of the Cedar Hill Cemetery with W. H. Allingham, president, in the chair met last night and conducted routine business. Small bills were ordered paid, and a report of the improvements made to the cemetery of late was received. Those present were George Gray, treasurer; George Hartshorne, secretary; James Williamson, W. J. Linton, Thomas Rippey and Mr. Allingham.
