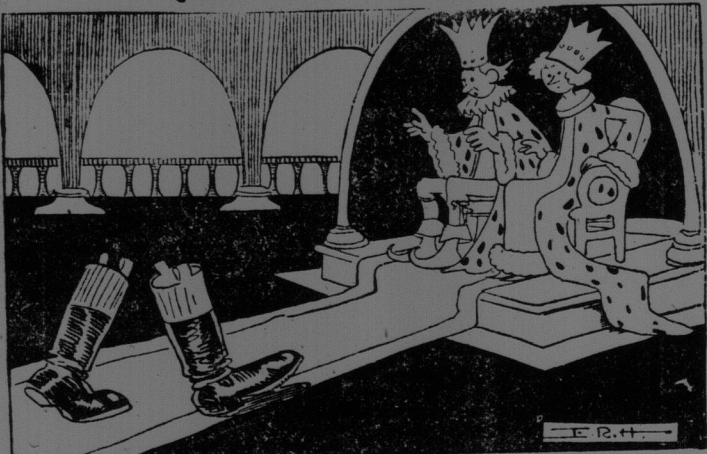

"What do you want?" cried the king shakily.

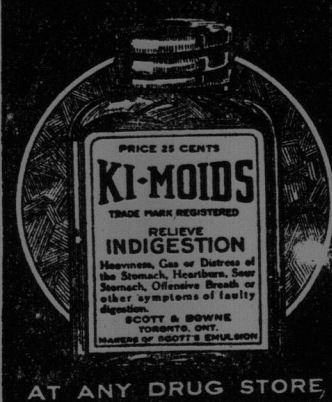
On went the Twins through the hallway of the palace toward the throne room where sat their majesties, the giant king and queen to Beantalk Land.

HEALTH PENALTIES

LEVIATHAN WAS BADLY DAMAGED

Boston, Feb. 28.—The steamship Leviathan was found today to have sustained serious damage from running aground last December off Robbins reef in New York harbor. When examined in dry dock here it was found that the steamer's plates were twisted and torn over an area about 220 feet long and 10 feet wide. In four or five places the hull was pierced through and a groove a foot deep had been cut for 10 feet along one side of the keel. The Leviathan registers 55,000 tons.

MODERN GIRL WINS OVER MAID OF 1824

Telephone Company Employs Debate Resolution and Present Tableaux

Any notion that the girl of 1824 was a superior type of womanhood to the girl of 1924 received a bit of a setback last night when members of the staff of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, Ltd., debated the question, and the judges delivered a unanimous decision in favor of the negative side of the resolution and of the modern girl.

BARN BURNED DOWN BUT HOUSE ESCAPED

Tenants Moved Into Previously Unoccupied Dwelling Only Yesterday

Only the direction of the wind saved the new two-story wooden residence of David MacPherson, about two miles from Spruce Lake, from being destroyed by fire last night when the barn, about 50 yards away, was burned to the ground. Up to yesterday the property had not been occupied during the winter as Mr. MacPherson is in Boston. The new tenants, a family named Hatfield, moved in only yesterday. There were five tons of hay in the barn and there may have been some machinery. The cause of the fire could not be learned last night.

George MacPherson, of Fairville, a son of the owner, said last night that he had not been at the farm for some time and could not say what the contents were. He knew there was a considerable amount of machinery on the farm and that last summer his father had had the barn thoroughly repaired. The nearest neighbors are about a mile distant. Samuel Stern, of South Bay, is one of the owners and his property adjoins. He went to the barn and there was nothing that could be done. The fire burned briskly while it lasted and caused some alarm to residents of Fairville. By 11 o'clock it had burned itself out.

It is not known whether there was any insurance.

RED CROSS QUILTS MADE OF SCRAPS

The Red Cross workers at Lakeville have discovered how to utilize the scrap material from the headquarters

office and convert it into dainty and attractive quilts. Clippings of white flannelette left when babies' garments are cut out are sent in a large bundle to the Lakeville branch, which has recently sent back to headquarters one of the flannelette comfortables made from these scraps. The scraps have been sewn together in regular patchwork fashion and the quilt edged off with buttonholing and tufted neatly with pale blue wool. The quilt is a welcome addition to the emergency supplies at the depot. The Kilburn branch of the society recently completed a membership drive. The Kilburn branch sent an acceptable donation of \$10 towards the depot expenses.

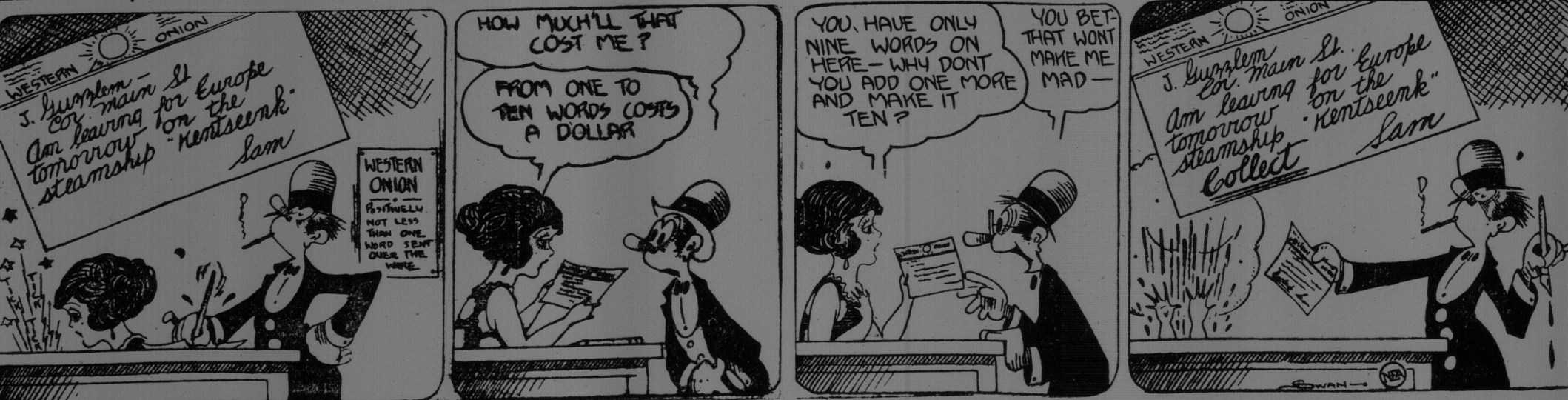
