
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### REPORT COMMITTEE ON REDISTRIBUTION HAS STRUCK SNAG

Members Begin to Discuss  
Possibility of Redistribu-  
tion Going Over to Next  
Session — Ontario Seats  
Reported Stumbling Block

Ottawa, April 30.—Hon. E. M. MacDonald will continue to act as chairman of the redistribution committee. It is announced, while acting as Minister of National Defence. It is understood that progress in that committee is practically at a standstill, however, and members are beginning to discuss the possibility of the redistribution problem going over until next session. The stumbling block in the committee, which meets in private, is said to be the rearrangement of seats in the province of Ontario.

#### HAS 5,481 STUDENTS.

Chicago, April 30.—Official announcement is just made of the attendance at the University of Chicago for the spring quarter, up to April 14.

In the Graduate School of Arts and Literature 446 students are enrolled, and in the Ogden Graduate School of Science 427, a total of 873. In the Senior Colleges there are 1,064 and in the Junior (including the unclassified) 1,219, a total of 2,283.

In the Professional Schools there are 192 Divinity students, 206 in the medical courses, 280 law students, 222 in education, 310 in commerce and administration, and forty-one in social service administration, a total of 1,470. In University College 1,346 students are enrolled.

The total for the university, exclusive of duplications, is 2,088 men and 2,093 women, a grand total of 4,181, of whom 1,469 are graduate students and 4,212 undergraduate.

### JUDGE TURGEON TO PRESIDE OVER THE GRAIN COMMISSION

Will Inquire Into All As-  
pects of Grain Trade, In-  
cluding Inspection, Eleva-  
tors, Weighing, Grading,  
Mixing and Other Con-  
troversial Points.

Ottawa, Ont., April 30.—The personnel of the commission which is to inquire into the grain trade was announced this evening. The chairman is Mr. Justice Turgeon of the Supreme Court of Saskatchewan, and the other members are Dean Rutherford, of the faculty of Agriculture, University of Saskatchewan, Dr. McGibbon, professor of economics, University of Alberta, and James G. Scott, of Quebec, an authority on transportation questions. The secretary is R. J. Beachman, of Calgary.

The government proposes a fair inquiry into all aspects of the question, including the inspection in and out of the country, terminal and private elevators, weighing, grading, mixing and all other controversial aspects of the grain trade.

There was some idea originally of appointing a commission representing different branches of the trade, but it was felt that better results would be obtained by having the personnel divorced from the commercial end of the industry.

Mr. Justice Turgeon is a former New Brunswicker.

### TO TRY HALIFAX MAN ON CHARGE OF KILLING WIFE

Witnesses Say He Went to  
Home of Wife's Sister,  
Called Wife to Door and  
Shot Her Three Times.

Halifax, April 30.—Roy Green was committed for trial in the police court this morning on a charge of having shot and killed his wife at her temporary home in Brunswick street on the night of March 2, last.

Witnesses said that on the evening of March 22 Green came to the house in Brunswick street where his wife was living with her sister, called her to the door on a pretext and, after a short conversation known to no one but the accused, shot her three times, afterward turning the revolver upon himself, inflicting a minor wound. His wife died in her room whither it is alleged he pursued her firing as she tried to escape from him after the first shot.

The accused is about thirty-two. He was once a taxi cab driver and had been living apart from his wife for several months, because, it is said, he was unable to support her and their two children.

SUICIDE ON HIS WIFE'S GRAVE;  
NOTE DECLARES BANK SOUND

Griffin, Ga., April 30.—Sitting at the grave of his wife, Roswell Hill Drake, President of the City National Bank, shot himself to death. Participants in the Memorial Day exercises witnessed the suicide.

Drake left a note in which he said the bank did not owe a dollar of borrowed money or redemptions and was in as good condition as ever in its history.



### SAYS THE NEGROES WILL HAVE A LAND OF OWN SOME DAY

Marcus Garvey Foresees Not  
Far Distant African State  
That Will Cause the  
White Race to Awake and  
Wonder.

Buffalo, April 30.—"There will be a  
day not far away, when the black man  
will deal with the white man, as the  
white man dealt with the black man  
in the past."

Speaking here last night, Marcus  
Garvey, president-general of the Uni-  
versal Negro Improvement Association,  
made the foregoing prediction, which  
was greeted with wild demon-  
strations.

"Everybody has a flag but the coon,"  
Garvey began his speech. "This flag,  
the red, white and green, some day  
will flutter in the breezes of African  
climes, planted on top of every hill.  
There will be a day on which the  
white people will awake and wonder.  
It will be the day when the Lord will  
lead his people out of captivity, when  
the princes of Egypt will come forth  
and lead 400,000,000 negroes into their  
own. Uncle Sam will be wise enough  
to keep his finger out of this sort of  
international pie."

### The "Red" Church Triumphant

Will Work "Spiritually" for the  
Social Revolution in Russia

Moscow, April 30.—The Living  
Church, which recently accepted the  
Communist party programme, and  
which considers it possible to work  
spiritually for social revolution, while  
retaining the elements of Christianity,  
had a tremendous majority when the  
first convocation opened here today.

After the religious ceremony a re-  
solution was adopted thanking the  
Soviet government for "the freedom of  
conscience permitted and the use of  
the church of Christ the Saviour for  
the meeting."

As only 250 of the expected 500 dele-  
gates had arrived, the business sessions  
of the convocation, which will probably  
continue for several weeks, were pos-  
tponed until Wednesday.

### BLISS CARMAN TO MAKE VANCOUVER HOME IN FUTURE

Toronto, April 30.—J. Murray Gib-  
ben, last year's president of the Cana-  
dian Authors' Association at the ban-  
quet held in the Arts and Letters Club  
Saturday night, announced that he had  
learned that Bliss Carman, the dis-  
tinguished Canadian poet, who lived

for many years in Connecticut, had  
decided, in view of the warmth of the  
reception given him in Canada, that he  
could not longer sign himself as of  
"New Canaan, Connecticut," but would  
be hereafter "Bliss Carman, Van-  
couver."

#### LONDON-BERLIN-MOSCOW AIR SERVICE IS READY

London, April 30.—Final arrange-  
ments for the inauguration of a Lon-

don-Berlin-Moscow passenger air ser-  
vice have been completed and the first  
airplane will leave here today. The  
through fare from London to Berlin  
will be \$30, which is only four cents a  
mile. At Berlin there will be direct air  
and rail connection to Moscow.  
The running time between London  
and the Russian capital will be thirty-  
six hours. Intermediate stops will be  
made at Amsterdam, Bremen and  
Hamburg.
