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CANADA MAKES BIG BOND ISSUE

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

New York, July 6.—The Canadian government, on behalf of the Canadian National Railways, has sold to a New York syndicate of bankers, headed by Dillon, Read & Co., \$25,000,000 of twenty-five year six and one-half per cent. sinking fund gold debentures of the Canadian Northern Railway, according to an announcement made here late tonight. The bonds will be placed on sale tomorrow at 98 1/2 to yield 6.80 per cent. The syndicate is the same that put out an issue of \$25,000,000 twenty-five year seven per cent. bonds last fall for the Canadian National and Grand Trunk railways.

AT 96 WALKS 80 MILES TO SEE DAUGHTER BURIED

London, July 7.—A pathetic story was told to the Chatham magistrates when James Smith, aged ninety-six, an army veteran, applied for financial help. It was stated that the old man had tramped from Chatham to Folkestone to attend his daughter's funeral and then walked back, a total distance of eighty miles. He had no food for two days. Financial aid was given him.

GIVES HARDING LARGE POWERS TO HELP TRADE

Special Provisions in U. S. Tariff Bill to Aid in Stimulating Foreign Commerce—Canada will be Affected.

(Special Despatch to The Toronto Globe)

Washington, July 8.—Although protection of American industries was the prime consideration in drafting the Fordney Tariff Bill, its framers believe they have provided several features which will prove a stimulus to foreign trade.

The special provisions which are designed to aid in securing favorable treatment of American products by other countries include the following:

Authority under which the president may reduce rates of duty by not more than 20 per cent. in return for special favors granted by a foreign country.

Authority under which the president may impose duties equal to those of another country when that nation maintains a discriminatory rate of duty on American goods.

To Negotiate Treaties.

Authority under which the president may negotiate commercial treaties providing for reduction of duties or the complete elimination of duties on specified articles, subject to ratification by Congress.

Authority under which the president may impose a duty on Canadian lumber unless Canada removes its present duty.

Retaliatory duties on coal to be levied when duties are maintained by Canada or any other nation.


Reduction of duties on automobiles in view of seeking similar cuts in present rates of duty of France and other countries on American cars.

Similar reductions in duties on canned goods with a view to inducing South American countries to remove high duties assessed against American canned products.

Agreement for Five Years.

The authority given the president to reduce duties by 20 per cent. is one of the broadest of the bargaining provisions of the bill and was inserted in the measure in compliance with desires expressed by President Harding. This particular section contains no restrictions relative

STATE OF TRADE IN THE UNITED STATES

Bradstreet's, Saturday.)

Outstanding features of the week are a further quieting down of trade at wholesale, a slower pace in most, not all, industries, continued slow collections and a rather more spotted crop situation. On the other hand, midsummer and pre-inventory sales by jobbers and extensive sales of light seasonal wearing apparel at retail, a much better tone in the stock market with a practical cessation of shore selling, another German reparations payment, not accompanied this time by marked unsettlement of exchange rates, though these are lower; rather more encouraging reports from the railway industry, these dealing with a really good report of May net earnings; increased buying of repair materials by railroads, and prospects of governmental payments of deferred obligations to the roads, are among the more favorable developments in a rather dull, not to say depressed, trade and industrial situation. Spotty conditions are not confined to the crop outlook, different sections and lines of industry returning varying reports, ranging from fairly active to intensely dull. Textile trades seem to return relatively best reports, their pointing to more immediate capacity at work in some lines, and woolen, cotton and silk send best reports, their pointing to more immediate human needs being the chief concerns of buyers. Retailers' stocks of summer goods are reported light. On the other hand, basic industries, like iron, steel, soft coal, coke, lumber and agricultural goods, are generally down to implements, at every generally down to
