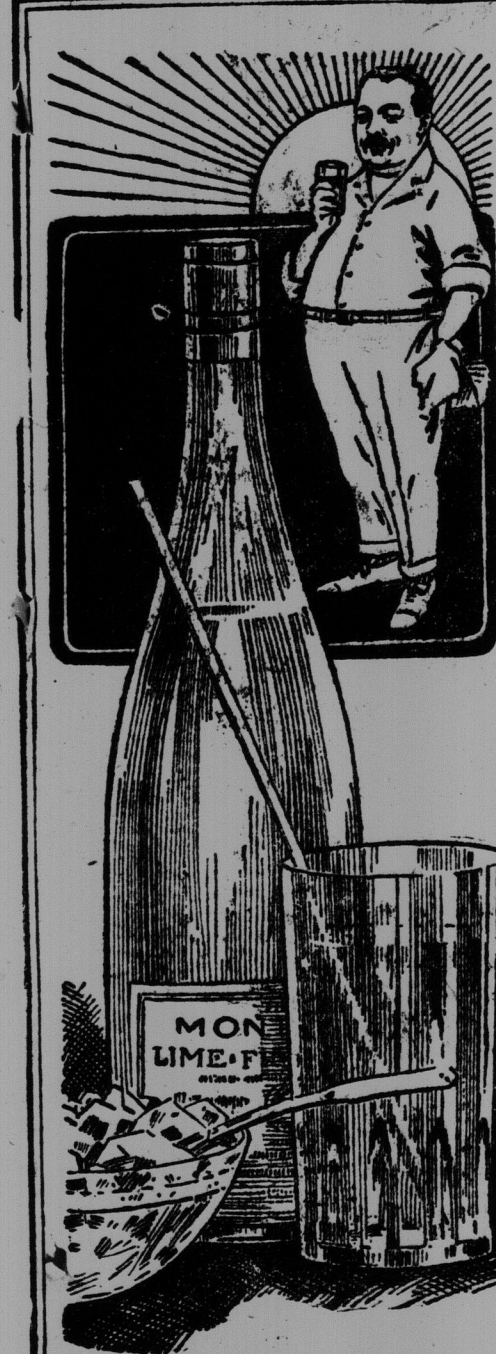

"I may shortly follow the matter up further," he added.
Asked about the letter in connection with the Crescent Creamery referred to by Mr. Murdoch, Judge Robson made the following statement:

"I had heard of the matter, but had absolutely forbidden the showing of the factum to me, and its receipt was entirely unlooked for. Against my wishes the letter was sent, and reached my office when I was away from Montreal. It was opened in my absence by a clerk, I assume, and was left lying exposed in my personal room, where it was found by Mr. Murdoch when searching my desk. I did not know that the letter had been sent till I returned to Montreal, and the fact that it was in my office was a great surprise to me as it was to Mr. Murdoch, as I had absolutely prohibited anything of this sort long before."

Judge Robson added: "As far as the statements relating to the cabinet ministers are concerned, they are, from my experience, equally absurd. I don't know of any facts whatever from which he could infer that the cabinet or any of the ministers were insincere about the board."
