BECOMING POSSIBLE TO SLAY WITH IMPUNITY

Light Sentences For Killing in Berlin in "Crimes of Passion"—Two Recent Instances

Berlin, June 1.—Berlin appears to have imported for itself what the French have called "crimes of passion," and to have extended their range far beyond the French example. A series of recent murders and attempted murders of men by women have been so lightly punished that the entire Berlin press is criticizing criminal authorities and juries severely. A conspicuous case aroused the press to protest. A young woman informed by her lover that he did not care for her any more, invited him for a farewell walk in the Tiergarten and shot him in the back of the head, killing him instantly. She was brought to trial, not on a charge of murder, but of manslaughter, and the public prosecutor admitted the existence of the mitigating circumstances which under a paragraph of the penal code are present "when the defendant at the time of the commission of the action was in such a condition that he did not realize what he was doing, or suffering under a pathological disturbance of the senses through which his power of decision was made impossible."

was present, due to the young woman's anger at being deserted. The sentence was for a year and a half to the penitentiary.

The most striking of the whole series of "crimes of passion" was the most recent. The woman in the case lived in an aristocratic quarter of Greater Berlin, apartments paid for by an admirer. The man began to show a coolness toward her and finally informed her that he intended to sever relations with her. She demanded the payment of a considerable sum, which was refused. Thereupon she invited him to a restaurant for a farewell supper. In a corner of the room, behind a screen, she drew a revolver from her muff and shot him four times. He was in a hospital for weeks and still carries one bullet in his body.

In this case, too, the woman was charged with attempted manslaughter, which involves a much lighter penalty than attempted murder. It was proved on her trial that she had told her servant girl that she intended to shoot the man, and that no woman is punished any more in Berlin for killing a recent lover. She had also written in a similar vein to relatives and friends, and after the shooting she boasted to her servant that she had sent four bullets into her victim.

The jury acquitted her, and the spectators in the courthouse applauded so loudly as to loudly that the judges ordered the room cleared and threatened fines for contempt of court.
The Kreuzzeitung, fairly representing the views of the entire press, comments: "It is perfectly plain that such verdicts, which we have seen repeatedly in the recent past, signify a danger to the security of the empire."
In administering the oath to a jury which began work this week a Berlin judge referred to the recent crimes by women and warned the jurors against permitting sympathy in such cases to warp their judgment.

Board of Trade Discusses C. P. R. Recommendations

BREAKWATERS NEEDED

Strong Protest Against Renewal of Gutelius Agreement—Report on Town Planning Conference

Two important matters for the future of St. John, both depending immediately on the present action of the citizens and business men, were discussed at the St. John Board of Trade last evening.

The first was the terms on which it will be possible to secure again the invaluable winter traffic of the C. P. R. passenger boats as against the present artificially fostered preference given to Halifax; the second the means which shall be taken to ensure that by proper town planning the city's future development shall be along lines that will not have to be remedied when the natural increase comes, as it will come, if that and other passenger traffic runs through St. John.

A resolution strongly worded protesting against renewal of the Gutelius-Bosworth agreement was moved by W. F. Hatheway at the meeting, seconded by R. B. Emerson, and unanimously adopted.

The resolution read as follows: "That this board renews its demand upon the federal government for fair and equitable treatment in the matter of ocean mails, and that it reiterates its unswerving opposition to the Gutelius-Bosworth agreement, or any other agreement of a similar character which may, in its operation, discriminate against the port of St. John, or deprive it of the geographical advantages it possesses."

In the summary of the secretary, R. B. Armstrong, of the board's action, it was stated that the last meeting of the full board, reference was made to the recent conference with Sir Thomas Shaughnessy at Montreal.

Sir Thomas then stated that St. John was the only Canadian port at the present time, that his company had suffered great financial loss by reason of the traffic arrangements of last winter, and that they were desirous of utilizing this port to the fullest extent if adequate facilities were provided for them. He said his information was that there would be no new wharves ready for this winter's business, and that the company would go as a unit to whatever port was ready for them. He did not think that the board should be asked to make a decision at the present time, as the time had facilities for such boats as the Albatross and Calgarion, and until such facilities were provided, the company would probably be placed on another route.

In accordance with Sir Thomas Shaughnessy's promise to send the company's marine superintendent to look over the ground, said the report, "Captain Walsh and Mr. O'Malley, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy's special engineers, arrived in St. John last week and in several conferences with the committee of the board discussed various matters which they believed to be required for the good of the port and for the Canadian Pacific railway."

They asked that the C. P. R. be allocated berths 2, 3 and 4, with No. 1 and its extension down the harbor designated as No. 15. They required that the city keep all craft clear of the fairway approaching these wharves, and that the potato sheds on the so-called C. P. R. wharves be made tight and in fit condition for the cargo.

They asked that all the berths at West St. John be sounded for depths, and a report of such soundings be forwarded to Captain Walsh in Montreal; that no craft be placed on the angle facing between berths 6 and 7, in order that same may be kept clear at all times. Also that all harbor tolls, wharfages, top wharfages and water charges to be equivalent to the amount as charged by the port of Halifax.

"Their request as far as the government is concerned include the extension of Negretown breakwater 700 feet towards Partridge Island, which would leave an opening between the island and the end of the breakwater, when extended, of 600 to 800 feet, a breakwater to be built from Partridge Island, extending north 62 degrees east from Partridge Island light, about 2,000 feet in length, a sea wall in the shape of a breakwater to be built about half a mile north of the shore and the breakwater. The latter is not urgent but recommended as the best development of the port."

The American Rock to be taken out and the terminal wharf, he said, the investment had to be constructed, or the harbor bulkhead built, and the 400 feet of breakwater to be filled up so that the railway can construct its tracks on its property farther inland.
