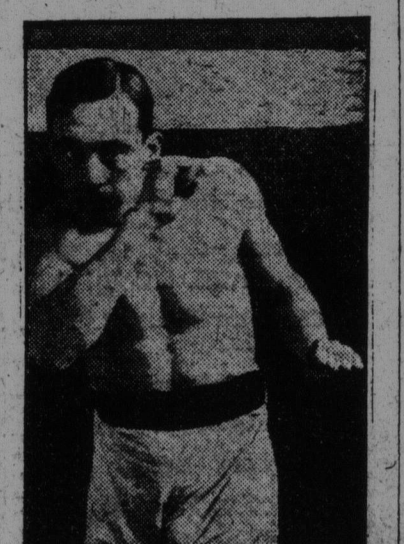

OBITUARY Mrs. Margaret A. Bazley. On Saturday there passed away at her residence, 114 Douglas avenue, one of the oldest and most widely known residents of St. John, in the person of Mrs. Margaret A. Bazley. She was born here in 1820 and was a daughter of Edward and Bethiah Walker, and a granddaughter of Dr. Alex. Batts, who was among the first of the United Empire Loyalists to come here. She lived here all her life and was always prominently connected with different charitable and benevolent works, including the building of Union Hall in the North End and the purchasing of the land for Riverview Memorial Park, and the erection of the monument to Canada's dead soldiers in South Africa, which now stands in the park. She was one of St. John's most public spirited women and her death will be sincerely mourned. She leaves three daughters—Mrs. Thomas R. Hilday, Mrs. Edward L. Jewett and Mrs. F. A. Roberts, all of St. John. The funeral will take place from her late residence tomorrow afternoon at 2:45 o'clock with service at 2:30.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES There were 1,777 persons killed and 9,067 injured on the steam railroads of Pennsylvania and 187 killed and 4,119 hurt on the electric lines during the year 1910. Thirty-two persons are reported killed and many injured in the wreck of a passenger train, through the collapse of a bridge on the Kowak railway in South Africa.
