

FAVORS ST. JOHN FOR NEW COKING PLANT

Deputy Mines Minister Will
Confer With Stanley El-
kin in Montreal.

That St. John was to be preferred to Montreal as the place to establish a large coking industry was the statement of Charles Cammell, B.A., L.L.D., P.R.S.C., F.G.S.A., Deputy Minister, Department of Mines, Ottawa, and chairman of the Federal Fuel Board, who passed through the city yesterday en route from Halifax to Ottawa. He will meet Stanley Elkin at the Ritz-Carlton in Montreal today.

Because of St. John's position on the coast, and the fact that the harbor is open the year round, permitting the importation of coal by steamer during the whole of the 12 months of the year, this city was to be preferred to Montreal, the harbor of which is accessible only part of the year. If the industry should be started in Montreal, Mr. Cammell said, it would mean a long rail haul for the coal during the winter, and this fact would operate materially against the commercial possibilities of the venture.

As Deputy Minister of the Department of Mines for Canada, he was naturally interested in anything that would make for better conditions in the mines of the Maritime Provinces. The establishment of a coking industry here on the scale planned, he said, would mean the stabilization of the mining industry in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and would beyond a doubt result in the working of the mines in these provinces 365 days every year.

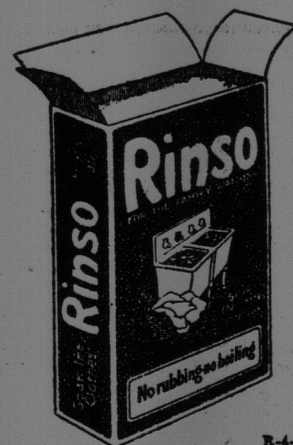

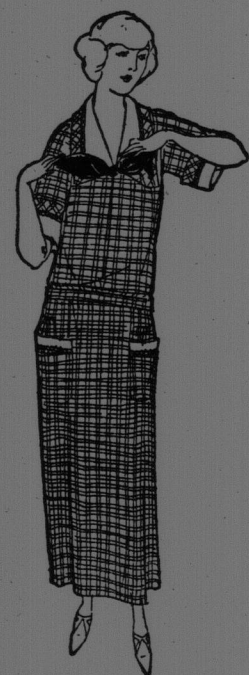

Boyish Morning Dresses Appear



The boyish influence is seen in one of the new Martha Washington Morning Dress designs. It occurs mainly in the pique collar and Black ribbon tie standing out against a solid color chambray of extra heaviness. Columns of White braiding run down right and left to hem. White shows again in pique cuffs, while the waist is gathered to give fullness to the skirt. Main colors—Golden Glow, Mauve and Cadet Blue. \$4.45.

Oversizes up to 52 are included in another new Martha Washington on straight lines. Chambray in Reseda Green, Gray or Copen, White Pique shawl collar bound in Gingham, three-quarter sleeves with matching cuffs and flower basket pockets done in lazy-daisy stitch with flowers in colors coming out within the arched handles. Sash girdle goes through the handles. Decidedly dressy and well made at \$3.95.

Variations of border trim occur in similar models, in embroidery in colors for one. The same price chooses large check gingham with Black bowed half tuxedo collars bordered by wide beading on White. Patch pockets complete the scheme, lines are straight and patterns assorted.
