



Paris, Aug. 28—While the strike sit-uation seems to be claming down at Havre, the agitation is gaining in Paris, and the Unitary General Labor Federa-tion and the extremists' united unions of the Seine department, both commun-ists organizations, have voted a twenty four hour general strike. The demon-stration is scheduled to begin tomorrow and appeals have been sent to the syndi-catist organizations through France co-operate. It is regarded as likely that the Conservative-Labor organizations also will decide to share in the manifestation.
