NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The old-fashioned coal coupler and the coal stove should have no place on a modern railway.

Those Irishmen who tore down the British emblem at the World's fair on Saturday hope to see Ireland a separate and distinct nation.

D. F. Bark says coal has been discovered in the Rainy River district. This statement, if true, is of great interest to people here.

Monetary Times.—There has been a decrease in the exports from Canada to Great Britain during the last nine months, of over 17 per cent.

Sir Charles Dilke controverts the statement of a distinguished British financier and politician that the great nations of Europe will shortly have to choose between bankruptcy and reduction of military expenditure.

A subject that is exciting great interest in old world medical circles at the present time is the cure of tuberculosis through the use of creosote. This new method has for its chief exponent J. Sommerbrodt, who has just published an interesting work in Germany. He says he has treated, not only lung affections, but laryngeal diseases with creosote and the results attained are highly satisfactory.

THE result of the fine cheese competition at the World's Fair has been published, and is of startling significance to all interested in the dairy industry of the Dominion. Cheese was judged by two United States and one Canadian judge. In the class for Cheddar cheese, made previous to 1893, Canada won 103 awards and the United States not one.

DEATH IN AWFUL FORM.

IMPRISONED IN BLAZING CARS THE PASSENGERS ARE ROASTED TO DEATH.

Many Canadians Among Them—Scenes of Indescribable Horror—Twenty-Six Charred Bodies Taken Out of the Wreck—Scores Were Terribly Injured—Orders Disobeyed. BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Oct. 29.—Twenty-six heaped of charred, blackened flesh, all that remain of what was that twenty-four hours ago were men, women and children in the enjoyment of life, health and happiness, rest upon the floor of an improvised morgue in the basement of a furniture store on this street.

Direct disobedience of orders on the part of the Chicago and Grand Trunk engineer and conductor, both of whom had seen long service with the company and were regarded as model employees, was the cause of the tragedy.

RESCUING THE SUFFERING.

The fire department was prompt in responding, but the nearest hydrant was nearly 2,000 feet away and when a line of hose was laid the pressure was not sufficient to throw a stream. Finally a stream was secured from another hydrant, the firemen meanwhile attacking the blazing wreck with axes, etc., but by the time a supply of water was available the telescoped coaches had been reduced to fragments of charred timbers, little more than the trunks remaining.
