

# TELEGRAPH NEWS.

London, Oct. 17. The weekly returns of the Bank of England show the amount of specie in the vaults decreased \$847,000 since the last statement made Oct. 10th.

The Garibaldians have taken possession of Nera in the Papal States, where they have entrenched themselves, and await the arrival of other bands to increase their number sufficiently to enable them to make a further advance.

Signor Acci, one of the deputies to the Italian Parliament, is Commander in Chief of the insurgents in that quarter of the Roman territory.

Just before the departure of the Emperor from Biarritz, on his return to Paris, he summoned a general council.

The result of its deliberations was the resolution that France should immediately intervene for the settlement of the Roman question, without conjunction with the Italian government to that end.

Gold 144.

London, Oct. 18. The following despatch has been received from Florence, dated last night:

It is reported that General Garibaldi has again escaped from Capri, and that he left the island on board an American ship.

The Garibaldians have appeared in the Western district between Rome and the sea. They have taken possession of the railway running between the city of Rome and the sea port of Ostia, and then, up the rails, proceeding all communication.

At a dinner to Earl Derby at Manchester last evening, Derby defended the position of the Government on the Reform question, and replied to some of the attacks on the Reform Bill.

Lord Stanley, Secretary of Foreign Affairs, spoke of the disturbed condition of Europe, and declared that notwithstanding the threatening condition of affairs, he still entertained hopes that peace would be preserved.

Paris, Oct. 18. Napoleon has made an imperative demand upon the Italian government for a strict observance on the part of Italy of the convention of September.

The expedition at Toulon is equipped and ready to sail to the relief of Rome, and only waits for the reply of Italy, which is hourly expected, to the demand of the Emperor.

It is believed that the Italian government will yield.

London, Oct. 19. The Fenian alarm does not abate.

Last evening repeated efforts were made to burn down the police station at Manchester, and thus release some of their comrades there consigned. The fire was extinguished before any damage was done.

The government is on the alert and precautions are everywhere taken to guard against surprise.

Springfield, Oct. 20. A terrible accident occurred at the Hoscoe Tunnel last Saturday, by which thirteen men were either killed outright or suffocated to death. The gasoline works at the mouth of the shaft exploded, setting fire to the building which contained them. The debris fell down the shaft, burying the whole gang of workmen at the bottom. The bodies will not be extricated for some days.

Toronto, C. W., Oct. 18. The Evening Telegraph says Government has received information regarding the plans of the Fenian Brotherhood of such importance as to warrant the issuance of secret instructions to commanders of military posts throughout the Province.

Hong and Ulrich, the counterfeiters, were before the Police magistrate again this forenoon. Decision was reserved until Monday.

A number of priests left Montreal to day on a mission to Florida.

Quebec, Oct. 19.—The steamer Canada was disabled opposite St. Croix from the bursting of her boiler steampipes. No person hurt.

The Bark Ouellet, from London for Quebec, went ashore in Fox river on the 13th. Crew saved.

Ottawa, Oct. 19. Ten petitions, bearing the signatures of 6000 persons, have been presented to the Governor General for the release of Mr. McMahon.

New York, Oct. 21. Gold 144.

Paris, Oct. 21. The results of Garibaldi's operations, reiterated, and seem to meet with no contradiction.

Mazzini has resigned his position at the head of the Cabinet. He will be succeeded by Gen. Menabrea.

Florence, Oct. 21. Mazzini addressed a large crowd of people who were making a demonstration in favor of Garibaldi. He declared that Mazzini would maintain the honor of the nation in the crisis through which it was passing.

DEATH OF MR. WICKHAM, M. P. FOR BRADFORD.—A vacancy has occurred in the representation of Bradford by the death of Mr. Henry Wickham Wickham, which took place yesterday afternoon at his residence, Chesham-place, Leamington. Mr. Wickham was a Liberal Conservative, and was first returned to Parliament for Bradford in 1852, but was previously unsuccessful and contested the borough in 1847. (London Times.)

Capt. Dodge, of bark T. H. Armstrong, has been arraigned at New Orleans for inhospitable treatment of two snow-birds, boys, who went on board his vessel at Liverpool, thinking they were bound for New York, where they hoped to find work; they were orphans without home or money. He tied one of them to a stanchion, with his hands behind his back, rested his chin on a sharp stick, forcing it so far

back that it was kept in that position, and causing the lad great pain and suffering. This he continued for eight hours, occasionally coming along, choking the boy, and pouring half a pint of sea-water at a time down his throat. He put him naked into a tub filled with sea-water and lime, and then made the other boy rub him with a hard brush and with sand paper. He beat the boy with a club, and boot jack, and used him so badly that the Judge, who held the prisoner to bail in \$5,000, said that in thirty years' experience a more barbarous and inhuman case had not come under his notice.

SUPERBUILDING IN GREAT BRITAIN.—It appears from the trade returns recently laid before the Imperial Parliament that 917 vessels were built in Great Britain last year. The Sunderland builders are credited with 149 of this number, Glasgow 121, Newcastle 44, Hull 39, Liverpool 38, and London 32, the remainder coming from other ports in the kingdom.

The Church Magazine says:—It has been confidently asserted that the Rev. Canon Gray, will resign the rectory of Trinity Church in this City, on account of ill health, and that the Rev. James Hill will be appointed in his place.

It has, it appears, been decided that goods cannot be shipped in Bond from the United States to the British Provinces by vessels calling at any intermediate ports in the Union.

A correspondent of the Telegraph writes:—It ought to be generally known to the importers of St. John that the Yarmouth steamer Linda affords an opportunity of getting over this difficulty of paying for a certificate, as she does not touch at an intermediate American port, and besides she is one of our own steamers and ought to be encouraged.

THE ANNUAL CATTLE SHOW AND FAIR of the Charlotte County Agricultural Society, was held at its grounds, Bay Side, on the 17th inst. The previous day the Ploughing Match was held on Mr. C. Kennedy's lots. The successful men were—John Dolby 1st prize, C. Greenlaw 2nd do, Geo. Stewart 3rd do, with horses. J. Cury 1st, John McFarlan 2nd, with Oxen. The third class was for boys with horses or oxen—J. McLaughlin 1st, Wm. Hill 2nd. Some prizes not competed for were awarded to Wm. Rollins and James McBride.

On the 17th inst. the Show grounds and were much pleased with the appearance of the stock and the produce exhibited; owing to two other Exhibitions being held in other parts of the County the same day, the quantity and variety were not so great as in former years, but the quality was quite as good. A list of these successful competitors will be seen on our outside page.

The day being fine a number of persons from Town and Parish were present on the grounds, among whom was a respectable number of the fair sex. In the Society's Hall were some good specimens of Grain, roots, dairy produce, domestic manufactures, and Fruits. In the field were superior horses, and neat cattle. The wheat was excellent, as was also the oats, buckwheat, potatoes, carrots, and leeks. Rev. A. D. Thomson's Parsnips were equal to any raised in the Province, and the potatoes for quality and size could not be excelled, the butter was declared first rate. The clover was also highly commended; the fancy work was highly creditable to the young lady who executed it, and the mink, mink, socks, and mittens, were pronounced excellent of their kind.

The horses were much praised, the show of neat cattle, with the exception of one cow, was not equal to previous years.

The fruits and honey we can state were the best ever exhibited at the Fair of the Society.

During our stay, we were indebted to the hospitality of our friend Mr. W. Bradford, whose attention and kindness will not soon be forgotten. The days sports were wound up by horse racing. A more orderly gathering have rarely witnessed. We are pleased to record, that no liquor was to be had on the grounds and everything passed off most agreeably.

The London Times says that the Board of Admiralty have marked their sense of the heroism and ability displayed by Admiral Farragut during the late War of the States, (who is now their guest), by paying him the greatest compliment viz: of inviting him to join them in their official visit to the Eastern Dock Yards. Besides \$5 collected by Sheriff Paul next day to defray expenses to Saint David's Hotel expenses \$5, and attendance at meeting \$1, leaving a balance of \$33 to the credit of the good town St. Andrews.

DISASTER.—During the recent disastrous gales a new schooner, named the Julia Dush, belonging to Canine, Maine, with a crew of 25 men, struck on a reef about a mile and half from the shore of the Magdalen Islands, and all were lost. Evidently, the men attempted to swim ashore, as ten bodies were driven in perfectly naked. The loss of life has been terrible among the fishermen. (Hal. Express.)

JAMES JOHNSON, Esq., late Auditor General, a gentleman who in his public capacity as an official of the Government, as well as in his demeanour as a private citizen, has been only known to be respected, is about to take his departure from among us, having, we understand, assumed new and important duties under the Hon. Minister of Customs, requiring his presence at Ottawa. He carries with him the best wishes of his fellow citizens, and we believe of the Province at large. (Fredericton Reporter.)

We understand that negotiations for the speedy commencement of work on the Fredericton Branch Railway, are now pending. In these negotiations, in order to maintain what is so very desirable, the confidence of the County, the directors will require to exercise great prudence and caution. The route of the Intercolonial may be largely influenced by this branch, which is in itself a highly important consideration. (Hbid.)

Three young ladies from Portland, Me., join three from Lowell, Mass., and one from Salem and the seven will leave for Europe on the 19th, with the intention of studying the languages music and painting in Russia and France. They go unaccompanied and will remain abroad about six months.

Advices from Honolulu state that the reciprocity treaty with the United States, just ratified by the King, will create a deficiency in the Hawaiian revenue estimated at \$100,000. The Parliament has passed a bill providing for the deficiency by increasing three fold the tax on real and personal property, and authorizing special duties on opium and tobacco. The revenue changes will go into force with the treaty.

The Harve journals state that four officers and ninety four men, Austrians and Belgians of the Mexican foreign legion, with a woman and three children arrived in that town from Southampton. They were in a most miserable condition being without means to procure either food or clothing. M. Froxoux, Consul for Austria, immediately gave them five francs each for their present wants, and some of the men having appeared on the Place Louis XVI, their appearance excited such commiseration that a subscription for them was opened on the spot, which soon amounted to three hundred francs. They also received gifts of provisions and linen. Some of them being fearfully maimed, one having lost both eyes and hands by the explosion of a cannon.

The potato crop in Nova Scotia is not likely to be an average one. The papers tell us that even in districts not much affected by the rot, the yield, not owing to some cause, will be light.

DROWNED.—On Thursday night last Mr. Reahow Ferguson, an old well known resident of this city, came to his death by drowning, on the beach to the North East of the barracks. His body was discovered next morning by Mr. James Vanhorne, and taken to his residence, Queen Square. The Coroner held an inquest on Friday afternoon, and a verdict of "Found Drowned" was returned. (Fredericton.)

A Baptist paper, published in London, declares that the preachers most worthy of honor are men of great gift of waist and adds that it is difficult to put the same amount of confidence in the slender speaker that may be reposed in his stouter brother.

An artilleryman in Canada tried to desert by disguising himself as a negro. He was hand cuffed and brought before his comrades. The derision his appearance excited was his only punishment, but a sufficient one.
