Epworth league picnic at the waterworks. Nothing of importance broke the quietness of the day in town, which was generally observed as a holiday. The 22nd of June seems to have satisfied the people fully.

THAT MAD DOG.

Word has been received from the doctors who examined the dog's head that was sent to Toronto some days ago. It is feared that perhaps the examination will not prove altogether satisfactory, inasmuch as the head was so far decomposed. Some guinea pigs and rabbits were inoculated, but it is thought that probably blood poisoning will set in before the animals have had time to develop hydrophobia, if there is any. The case is thought sufficiently suspicious to warrant every precaution being taken.

PROUSE'S CORNERS PICNIC.

The picnic at Prouse's Corners, yesterday, was a decided success in every way. It was well patronized by people living in the vicinity and a large number of young people from town, also, were in attendance, enjoying themselves immensely. The amusements furnished consisted of a football game, bicycle, foot and wheelbarrow races, and guessing matches. Music was provided by the Mt. Elgin brass band and by local singing talent. The proceeds netted quite a large sum.

THE COMMISSIONER'S VISIT.

Great Preparations in the S. A. for to-night.

Great preparations have been made by the local corps of the Salvation Army for the visit to-day of Commissioner Eva Booth and the staff band that will accompany her. The rink has been fitted up to seat 2,000 people and is decorated nicely. The programme will begin at eight o'clock and will consist of an address by Miss Booth; music by the band; exhibitions of club swinging by Major and Mrs. Gaskins, Dot and Jai, and singing by Toodles and Toddes. A banquet will be given from 6 to 8 o'clock in the barracks, to which the admission will be 15c. At the rink the admission is a silver collection, chairs 25c and other seats 10c.

BASEBALL AT THE PARK.

Notwithstanding that there was no celebration of Dominion Day in Ingersoll, our citizens were not without their amusements. There were numerous picnics in the immediate vicinity, which were attended by many from here, while those who were possessors of wheels hid themselves off for a spin over the good roads hereabouts. Those who remained in town and took a walk over to Victoria Park in the afternoon, were well repaid by witnessing a baseball match which if not particularly scientific was at least interesting, and was thoroughly enjoyed by a good crowd of spectators. The competing teams were made up from the park factory and Noxon's foundry, the former proving the victors by a score of 27 to 13. The foundry-men take their defeat philosophically, and believe if it had not been for the "windy city" pitcher of the opposing team the result would have been different. A return match will no doubt be arranged in the near future.

CHARLES STREET SABBATH SCHOOL PICNIC.

A large number of the scholars and their friends were present.
