WASHINGTON, July 26.—Whether there is to be peace in the Far East or a continuance of the war will practical-Little progress has been made in the direction of an armistice. Japan has, in the most determined manner, in the most determined in an armistice until her

It is known that Japan will demand an indemnity that will approximately cover the cost of the war to date. This was communicated to Russia early in was communicated to Russia early in the preliminary negotiations. The amount is still a secret, but it is based upon the most careful estimates of the war and will be accompanied by a more or less detailed statement showmore or less detailed statement showing the method by which the final figures were computed. It will not fall far short of one billion dollars, according to advices reaching here from well posted sources. Besides the indemnity it is believed Japan's other essentials to the continuance of negotiations are the cession to Japan of Sakhallen, of the Liaotung peninsula, and of the railway as far as Harbin; the recognition of Japan's predominating influence in Korea, and the return of Manuchuria to China.

As for subjects remaining to be discussed, a tedious one, it is believed, and one which Russia will be disposed to negotiate with the greatest caution. is the programme for the restoration of Manchuria to Chinese control. 
