Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him, or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section elsewhere. The homestead price is \$200 per acre. It may be paid in six months in cash or six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right at 4 cannot obtain a pre-emption may it be a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$200 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

TEN ARE KILLED IN A TROLLEY COLLISION

SPOKANE, Wash., July 31.—Ten persons were killed and at least six injured in a head-on collision of two electric trolleys on the Spokane and Inland Railway late this afternoon.

The wreck occurred at Coldwell, Wash. The heavily-laden coaches were crushed and the men and women in them thrown into the air. Some being hurled to the tops of the coaches, while others were sent flying through the windows. Several coaches left the track and passengers were caught under the pile of broken wood and steel.

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MAY BE ANOTHER MURDER IN ALBERT

HOPEWELL HILL, Aug. 1.—The somewhat unusual circumstance in connection with the death of Sydney Miller, a young Englishman, whose body was found in the pond near the Albert Manufacturing Co.'s quarry at Hillsboro on Friday have occasioned considerable speculation as to the exact particulars of the sad tragedy, and an inquiry is now in progress in order that the facts may be fully elicited.

The report is that the unfortunate young man is supposed to have gone in bathing on his return from the village, which was quite late at night on Thursday, the body being without clothing when found on Friday morning by the section men on the Plaster Co.'s railway. These men discovered the man's clothing on the bank of the pond and making an investigation found the body lying face downwards a short distance from the bank in about 12 feet of water. Miller had been out on Saturday morning on his last visit to the village, and about 10 o'clock left on his return to the boarding house at the quarry.

He did not appear at the house that night, and the people there state that one of the men arrived late at the house said that he had stopped there to go in bathing. This is considered by some as a rather strange thing to do at that hour of the night, especially as Miller, it is understood, was not

accustomed very much to go in bathing and had been known on more than one occasion to decline to go the water, saying that he could not swim. When found the body showed a light cut on the face over one eye.

The remains were taken to the undertaking establishment of A. B. Lander and interred on Friday afternoon. Dr. Randall, the coroner, on being summoned, was of the opinion that it was not necessary to have an inquest, but later on decided to do so. An adjournment of the enquiry was made on Wednesday in order to obtain full particulars of the unfortunate affair. Miller, who was between 25 and 28 years of age, was a native of England and was unmarried. When his clothing was examined after the tragedy there was in a pocket a small sum of money and a letter from the unfortunate man's mother, which had been opened and which the deceased had received at the office at Hillsboro on his last visit to the village.

The body of Chas. Kinzie, the ten-year-old son of Geo. Kinzie of Moncton, who was drowned at that place a couple of weeks ago, was found in a creek a short distance above Gray's Island, Hillsboro, on Saturday morning by Chas. Simpson of Demarest Creek. The body had floated down the river some fifteen miles.

MYSTERY OF THEFTS ON CALUM AUSTIN CLEARED

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 1.—The mystery of the series of robberies on the steamer Calum Austin, of the Eastern S. S. Company, plying between this port and St. John, N. B., by which during the past two weeks the boat and its passengers have lost thousands of dollars, is believed by the police of this city to have been cleared up. The men arrived late at the port and the arrest today of Thomas W. Wright, aged 21, a colored porter on the steamer.

During the past two seasons the steamship company has used many devices to ferret out the thief, Canadian police officers travelling on the boat and private detectives being employed, but all efforts have proved fruitless. When the Austin left Boston last week, however, on the trip just ended today, Inspector Patrick

Gettles, of the bank squad of the Boston police, sailed on her, having given up one week of his vacation for the purpose of solving the mystery. On the return trip suspicion was fastened on Wright with the result that when the boat arrived today he was arrested.

Upon being searched he was found to have two watches which had been reported stolen, one of which was valued at \$25 and the other at \$50. The police claim they recovered more than \$500 worth of booty in the man's room in Halifax. On his person was also found a bankbook, showing that in the last 35 days he had deposited in a Boston bank about \$250. He is held by the police on the specific charge of the larceny of two watches. He will be given a hearing tomorrow.

FIRES THREATEN MANY VILLAGES

BOURNE, Mass., July 31.—Two great fires in the woods and cranberry bogs of Cape Cod, which broke out today and threatened to destroy villages and settlements were under control tonight for the time being, the hundreds of fire-fighters having been aided in holding the flames in check by a dead calm which appeared at sunset. The only buildings destroyed were a large barn in Cataumet, owned by Reuben Lawrence and a cranberry house owned by Benjamin Bourne at Dry Cedar swamp at the head of the bay.

The most serious fire of the two started in the Bourne woods just before noon and assumed such proportions at 1 p. m. that every available man in the villages of Pocasset, Cataumet, North Palmouth, Hatchville, Monument Beach and Buzzards Bay was summoned to save buildings in the path of the flames.
