DIGGS IN DEPOSITION SAYS WOMAN ASKED HIM OUT TO FIGHT

Statement Taken At Hospital Yesterday Afternoon—Mary Rumbley, His Assailant, Has Plea Of Self Defence.

In the presence of the woman who stabbed him and under the supposition that he would die, Joseph Diggs yesterday afternoon made a deposition setting forth the facts of the conflict at Willow grove on Sunday in which he was grievously wounded.

The Deposition. Diggs in his deposition stated that he went to Willow grove on Saturday and on Sunday morning the woman came to Thompson's house where he was staying.

The Woman's Story. The Rumbley woman tells a far different story. She says that Diggs called her insulting names and on her replying, caught her by the hair and striking her, forced her to the floor.

F. C. SPENCER WILL CONVERT ORPHEUM INTO PUBLIC HALL. Has Secured Former Princess Theatre For Lectures And Political Meetings—Change Takes Place In January.

Berryman's Hall on the corner of Princess and Charlotte streets, which has had a chequered career as a five-cent amusement house, first under the name of the Princess Theatre and later as the Orpheum, has been taken over by Mr. Fred G. Spencer. It is Mr. Spencer's intention to convert the theatre into a public hall where lectures, concerts and political meetings can be held.

Speaking with The Standard last evening Mr. Spencer said that the city had at least plenty if not too many amusement houses but there was a dearth of public meeting places, and it was on this account that he had taken over the building and proposed to make the change.

Besides taking over the management Mr. Spencer has purchased the entire plant of the theatre which is said to be the most expensive of its kind in the city.
