

## NATIVE PROVINCE HAPPENINGS DAY BY DAY

P. E. I. LEGISLATURE  
WILL CLOSE TODAY  
AFTER BUSY SESSION

Charlottetown, April 23.—The legislature will adjourn on Thursday after being in session for six weeks. The estimated expenditures amounting to more than \$500,000 were put through in one hour. As there was only one opposition member in the house during the voting of this half million there was very little discussion. Several questions were asked by other members, but every item was practically allowed to pass unchallenged and without division. Education is the biggest item, amounting to \$165,155. Unlike other provinces, Prince Edward Island pays almost the entire educational bill through the government. There will be an increase in the teachers' salaries amounting in all to about 25 per cent. The government is to supplement the amount voted by each school district to each teacher up to 25 per cent of what is known as the statutory allowance. For instance, the statutory allowance allows \$300 for a male teacher of first class. The district will vote, say \$50 which is little above the average. Then the government will pay \$50. If the district was usually generous and would give \$100 supplement, then the government would give \$75 additional, being the maximum amount. A new increase this year, however, will be \$1 a head for the average daily attendance of pupils amounting in all to \$22,000 a year.

The government will spend more in advertising the province this year, will assist in building a sanatorium for treating tuberculosis patients, and give \$1,000 to the Carleton Place hospital.

The fourth judge may be appointed to the supreme court bench.

## BURIED AT HARVEY.

Harvey Station, April 21.—One of the oldest residents of these parts was buried today in the person of Mrs. Gardiner Essensa of Acton, aged 96 years and two months. Mrs. Essensa, who was formerly Ellen Hunter, contracted a heavy cold a few weeks ago and up to this time had been remarkably well and strong. She was a native of Coleraine, Ireland, and with her parents emigrated to this country many years ago when she was a young girl. At that time in many places the forest primeval reigned supreme in this land. Mrs. Essensa was endowed by nature with a strong constitution and an abundance of Irish wit. She belonged to a highly respected family and died trusting fully in the merits of Jesus as her Redeemer and Lord.

She leaves three sons, David A., councillor for the parish of Kingsclear; Charles, contractor and builder of Somerville, Mass.; and William in the west. Her son, Charles, arrived home on Saturday and was in time to see his mother and have a word from her before her death. Councillor S. B. Hunter of this village, is a nephew.

The funeral service was conducted by her pastor, Rev. M. J. Macpherson, who spoke highly of the deceased.

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NEWS OF THE DRIVES  
ON ST. JOHN RIVER

Fredericton, April 23.—The first raft or bank logs are due to arrive at Springhill today. There is a great demand for logs this spring from millowners and high prices are expected to rule for bank logs at Springhill. One buyer said today that he expected the opening price would be about \$14 per thousand for merchantable spruce and \$10 for batens with \$9 for hemlock and about \$8 or \$9 for hardwood.

Edward Burrill's lumber drive on the Keswick River has been temporarily abandoned, but the work of bringing out the logs will be resumed just as soon as some warm weather or heavy rains cause the water to rise.

Mr. Burrill said this morning that he did not anticipate very much trouble in getting out his drive this year. He has 5,000,000 or 6,000,000 feet of logs to come out but there is plenty of snow and lots of ice in the woods on the Keswick as yet and warm weather and rains are all that are needed.

Word reached here today that the Edward Partington Company's drive in the Tay, a branch of the Nashwaak was hung up and that it was doubtful if there would be enough water to bring out the logs there this spring. It is said that the prospects are equally gloomy for some of the other drives on the Nashwaak, although heavy warm rains may relieve the situation.

THE LIQUOR ACT  
IN P. E. ISLAND

Charlottetown, P. E. I., April 23.—Prohibition has evidently come to stay in Prince Edward Island. The Temperance Alliance in annual meeting were not quite satisfied with present conditions and suggested amendments. Although their views will not be carried out in their entirety, their requests will be met with in part. Amendments are to be made to the act whereby drinking on the trains and at picnics is to be prohibited. Druggists and vendors must file with the provincial secretary, all certificates whereby liquor is sold as a medicine, and vendors violating the act will cease to be vendors. An effort was made to prohibit treating and to take away from all druggists the right to sell liquor for any purpose, but these requests the government did not entertain.

## NEW GAME ACT.

Fredericton, April 23.—The new game act in New Brunswick, which was passed at the recent session of the legislature to amend the act of 1909, will go into force on May 1st. In the Royal Gazette today a proclamation was published to that effect.
