




LENGTHEN PORTLAND SEASON.

Portland, Me., June 6.—It is gener-
ally believed in steamer circles that
one result following the chapter of
accidents occurring on the St. Law-
rence river this spring will be the
lengthening out of the transatlantic
steamer season at this port, the boats
running from here into May, instead
of winding up the season as hereto-
fore about the 25th of April. One or
two extra trips here in the spring
would bring them up the St. Lawrence
when most danger from ice would be
past. Even some of the Canadian
