PEACE LEADERS ADVANCE IN THE LATE AFTERNOON

American Smelters Strong Spot During Brief Period of Decline—War News Favors Bulls.

New York, Oct. 17.—A general reaction in the early afternoon centered in the war stocks, including most of the steel and equipment. It also affected the peace stocks moderately for a time.

American Smelters was a strong spot during the decline, and subsequently increased its gain for the day by several points. In the last hour most of the peace leaders assumed an upward trend, and other stocks recovered their losses in part. Trading passed the million share mark before 2:30, and there was little sign of any abatement of it in the market.

BELL TELEPHONE TO CHARGE MORE

Petitions Railway Board For Flat Increase of Twenty Per Cent.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—The Bell Telephone Company is applying to the railway board for a flat increase of twenty per cent. over existing local telephone rates in all Canadian cities in which the company operates a telephone system. This would mean an increase of \$9 in business and \$5 in residence telephones. The rates, if sanctioned, would be effective November 20th. It is also proposed to increase the cost of long distance calls to a minimum of ten cents for eight miles, and five cents for each additional eight miles.

A new service connection charge is also proposed, varying from two to six dollars. This covers installations. It is also proposed to charge \$2 for changing a name. It is expected that the application will be vigorously opposed.

FAIR BUSINESS IN COTTON MKT.

FIVE YORK CO. MEN GIVE UP THEIR LIVES OVERSEAS

Gunner Walter Adams, William Miller, Goole Parks, John B. Haviland and Albert E. Walker No More.

Fredericton, Oct. 17.—Sad was the news received today that Gnr. Walter Adams, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Adams, had given up his young life on the fields of France fighting his country's cause.

Prior to his enlistment he was employed as a city mail carrier. He was a most efficient employee of the government, and on his daily rounds always had a cheery word and a pleasant smile for every one whom he met. He was a very valuable member of the Fredericton band and was also a member of the Presbyterian church choir.

He enlisted with the 9th Siege Battery in September, 1917, and went overseas with a draft from that unit in December of the same year.

Mrs. Belle Miller, North Devon, received a message this morning that her son, William, who had previously been reported as seriously wounded, died of his wounds on October 6th.

He went overseas in the spring of 1916 with the 140th Battalion, and went immediately to France. He has since then been actively participating in many of the engagements that have made Canadian famous. He was 20 years of age.

Besides his mother he leaves one sister, Miss Bessie, employed in St. John, and two brothers, Carl and Harold, at home.

Goole Parks, of Burt's Corner, received the sad intelligence this morning that their only son, Goole, was reported killed in action. About ten days ago they received word that he was missing and had hoped he would turn up among the living. The young man went overseas with the 104th about two years ago. He was a boy of a strong personality and a favorite with all associates. Anxious to do his bit, he went forth to battle with the Hun.

He leaves, besides his parents, one sister, to whom the sympathy of all is extended. He was a nephew of Warden Brewer of the York Council.

John B. Haviland.

Miss Clara Haviland, of this city, received a telegram this morning from Washington, D. C., conveying the sad intelligence of the death of her brother, Jack, who went overseas with the American expeditionary forces. He is the son of the late Frank Haviland, a former resident of this city. Jack was born here. The only surviving relative is Miss Clara, sister, of this city.

Albert E. Walker.

Pte. Albert E. Walker, adopted son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Craig, Nashua, is reported killed in action September 27th.
