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LOCAL DELEGATES ARE APPOINTED
Rev. Dr. McLeod and Rev. W. V. Higgins to Meeting to Organize Dominion Baptists

CO-OPERATION SYSTEM
Planning to Improve Conditions of Work in India—Annual Meetings of Foreign and Home Mission Committees Held in St. John—Laymen in City Pulpits.

In anticipation of the projected union of the Baptists of Canada the foreign mission boards of the denomination are now in correspondence with a view of co-operation in the work. There are two such boards, one in Toronto and the other with offices in this city. The fields in which they carry on their work in India are adjoining, are both in the Telegu country and lie along the shores of the Bay of Bengal. The chief difficulty with which the board here has had to contend is an insufficiency of men for the stations opened. On the other hand the upper Canadian board has had volunteers offering faster than they can find places for them. The object of the correspondence is to introduce some system by which the one can help the other.

The first meeting of the Canadian Baptist union will be held in Ottawa in October. Rev. Joseph McLeod, D. D., of Fredericton will attend as the delegate from the Baptist executive here and Rev. V. Higgins as delegate from the foreign mission board. The meeting will be attended by delegates from all the churches in Canada. Under the proposed constitution each congregation, irrespective of membership, is entitled to send two delegates. One additional delegate may be sent for every 100 or more members above the first 100. It is also provided that each district meeting may appoint one delegate. All officers of the union are ex-officio members as are presidents or principals of educational institutions and editors of denominational papers.

One of the objects of the projected union is to form a dominion foreign mission board. There are now two of these boards, one in Toronto, the other in the maritime provinces. The total expenditure of these boards is about \$80,000, and it is expected that the union will be able to increase this to \$100,000. There will also be a Dominion home mission board which will cover a territory now left untouched by existing home missions. The location of the headquarters of the new foreign mission board is in Ottawa. There will also be a publication board to supply all the Sunday school and other literature needed by the churches in Canada and a Sunday school board to have general supervision over that branch of the church's activities.

The annual meeting of the maritime foreign mission board was held here yesterday afternoon when Rev. Wellington Camp was elected president. Rev. W. V. Higgins, secretary, and Rev. W. E. McIntyre, D. D., treasurer. The chief feature of the meeting was the presentation of a report from the laymen's missionary committee through T. S. Simms. In connection with the series of meetings to be held here from the 10th to the 18th inst. it was said that arrangements were being made to have the pulpits of the city filled by laymen on Sunday the 10th. The meeting was held in the hall of the Maritime Baptist church, and was attended by a large number of laymen and clergymen.

The reports from the missionary fields in India were to the effect that the monsoons had set in but that only slight rains had fallen in different places. It was added that, unless plentiful rains come, a general famine will ensue. The missionaries are doing their best to relieve the famine-stricken people. The merchants are holding it for higher prices and refuse to sell. To meet the situation the imperial and home governments are starting extensive relief works.

The foreign mission board here have sent \$500 of their funds to India. This is not to be given in direct donations but as payment for work done. The annual meeting of the home mission board was held on Tuesday when Rev. F. E. Bishop was elected chairman. Rev. W. E. McIntyre, D. D., secretary, and Judge F. W. Emmerson, of Moncton, treasurer. The board has decided to issue a new policy in dealing with the work. An executive committee was appointed to correspond with the various fields and supervise the work during the present year. This committee held a meeting yesterday and decided to engage a general secretary to have over the field giving his whole time to it. They are now in communication with a clergyman with a view to his acceptance of this post.

The reports submitted to the home mission board were considered very satisfactory. The treasurer reported that he had on hand a larger balance with which to begin the year than ever before. The quarterly blank forms will be issued to each of the 30 churches of the denomination to show them the exact amount of their benevolence in each of the departments. Each district will be asked to furnish to the secretary here as soon as possible the amount of its allotted assessment.

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VERDICT OF \$200 FOR MRS. TRENHOLM
Husband on the Stand in Suit Brought by Wife in Circuit Court.

Friday, Sept. 4.
In the suit of Trenholm vs. Trenholm in the Circuit Court, the jury yesterday afternoon, through the foreman, R. R. Patchell, announced that they had agreed on a verdict of \$200 for the plaintiff, without interest. They were out about an hour.

The defendant was on the stand yesterday. He admitted being on four occasions in jail on information of his wife. To secure his liberation from jail at East Cambridge he signed an affidavit, which stated that all statements circulated by him derogatory to her character were false and that his wife was an upright, virtuous woman.

To His Honor Trenholm stated that he conscientiously believed that if the plaintiff was not his wife he would owe her something. He swore that he did not assault her in Foster, R. I. He swore he owed \$20 for a man, but had secured \$15 from Mrs. Trenholm to defray his expenses from Fredericton to Providence. He did not purloin \$80 when he abandoned his wife in October, 1902.

The evidence closed the case for the defence and on rebuttal Mrs. Trenholm was called for the plaintiff. She was positive her husband never contributed any money into what he termed a "common fund." Trenholm, she said, beat her severely at Foster, R. I., and he was bound over to keep the peace for 20 years. In his testimony he said the charge was non-suit.

J. Milton Price represented the plaintiff. Mrs. Trenholm, H. A. Powell, K. C., represented the defendant. The jury returned a verdict for Mrs. Trenholm of \$200, with interest from the date of the trial.
