The Election.

The result of yesterday's election was

just what we predicted, except that Mr.

Burpee is at the head of the poll. We

suggested, in the first place, that Mr.

Burpee and Mr. Palmer be quietly

turned, without a contest, because Mr.

Burpee was in the Cabinet and Mr.

Palmer had shown himself an able and

faithful representative. But this would

not suit the "Butterflies." They would

sweep all the corruptionists out, they

would send a man to vote with the Minis-

ter, they would pass judgment on the en-

dorsers of the Pacific Scandal. "Put

Palmer out," urged Blake and Macken-

zie. "Put Palmer out," howled paper-suck-

ing Halifax papers. "Put Palmer out,"

cried the letter-thieving ring whose special or-

gan is the Montreal Herald. "We'll put

Palmer out" was echoed by the Minis-

terial papers of St. John. So Mr.

Jones was nominated. But Mr. Ellis,

fearing that Mr. Jones could not rally

the party to his support, and desiring

to make a sure thing of putting Palmer

out, took the field himself. A true Re-

sponse—a man of brains—should be

electd with the Minister, he said, and

announced himself to be the man. So

Mr. Jones retired, leaving the course

clear for the "Reform" champions to put

Palmer out. But the Public feeling was

strongly in favor of Mr. Palmer; the

"boys" who work for success at the polls

were enthusiastic for Palmer; and Mr.

Burpee's course was loudly denounc-

ed in his own Ward and elsewhere. The

Elimination of the Minister of Customs and

The election for the County yesterday

resulted in the return of the old mem-

bers, the Hon. Isaac Burpee and A. L.

Palmer, Esq. The number of votes polled

was large, and, as will be seen, the

Hon. Isaac Burpee polled the poll. His

number of votes was over four hundred

and that which elected him in 1872. Mr.

Palmer, on the contrary, polled yesterday

about sixty more votes than he did at

the last election. The result was received

with general satisfaction throughout the

city. In the evening bonfires were light-

ed in different places.

MR. PALMER'S FRIENDS.

held a meeting at the Bay View Hotel,

and their candidates were presented. A

number of old friends had now come also—

and all ample justice. Ald. Peters pro-

posed the health of the newly-

elected member, A. L. Palmer, Esq., in a

short and pointed speech, in which he

expressed his confidence in the success of

Mr. Palmer, and in his belief that the

people would support him. Mr. Palmer,

in responding to Mr. Palmer thanked his

friends who had worked so successfully for

him. He claimed he was the representa-

tive of the old Reform party—the party

that had carried on the war of re-

form in New Brunswick for years. The

party with which he had acted in Otti-

wa, he believed, represented the real re-

form ideas and progressive spirit of

Canada. The present party he must

health. In closing he proposed the

health of the Hon. E. Willis, to whom he

paid a warm tribute for his unflinching

loyalty to the Liberal party of New Brun-

swick.

Mr. Willis, in responding, made an

excellent speech, full of humor and point,

making a bid for their support in June,

which was received with cheers. Other
