DISTRICT AND GENERAL

The British army will go back to the pre-war military uniform. Seven thousand cattle in Alberta have been destroyed because there is no feed for them.

At St. John's church, Strathroy, vestry meeting five ladies were placed on the select vestry.

Sugar jumped to 25 cents a pound in many London grocery stores on Friday, and to 22 cents in Hamilton.

Accused of watering his milk, Waynesboro, Pa., farmer took his cow around with him and sold his milk served hot.

A paper found in a tree on a farm near Findlay, Ohio, after the recent tornado, had been blown from a town 55 miles away.

The Aldborough council offers a reward of \$15 to any person shooting any dog or dogs caught in the act of killing or worrying sheep.

Rat-payers of North Easthope are making a strong effort to obtain a general distribution of hydro power to the farmers of that township.

The G. T. R. express office at Alvinston was again broken into last week and another case of booze stolen. Entrance was made by breaking a window.

Statute labor has been commuted in Aldborough on all township roads, the amount of the same to be expended by ratepayers appointed on the several wards.

The Synod of Huron will meet at Brantford on May 10. This will be the second time in its long history that the Synod has been held away from London.

Weekly newspaper publishers in the Ottawa Valley district have decided to increase their subscription rates to \$2 a year, the new rates to go into effect the first of June this year.

John Gill, storekeeper at Tyrconnell, died very suddenly at his home there a few days ago. Before going to Tyrconnell eight years ago Mr. Gill conducted the general store at Campbellton.

The Strathroy Age says: The price of potatoes jumped to the record price of \$5 per bag on Saturday when Jos. Kidd made a big shipment of "spuds" from Mount Brydges. The farmers who have been holding their stores for the "peak" price are surely in luck.

The death of Margaret Stevens, relict of the late Thomas Stevens of Brooke, occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Blanchard, at Tyrconnell, on Wednesday, April 7. Deceased was the mother of James Stevens of Brooke and was in her 102nd year.

James Kirkpatrick of East Zorra had a narrow escape from death on Thursday, when he was buried under a mass of ensilage nearly six feet deep. When neighbors extricated him he was unconscious and his body was totally black. A few minutes longer and he would have been fatally suffocated. He is recovering.

Major G. N. Weekes, a returned officer and barrister, of London, says he has fifty divorce applications pending enactment of Federal divorce laws soon to be considered at Ottawa. Major Weekes states that a high percentage of the cases are to be instituted by men who returned from overseas to find that their wives had been unfaithful to them. The balance are largely from the wives of men who after securing their discharges returned to England and failed to communicate with or maintain their families.

Toronto, April 14.—Recommendations are being drafted for the minister and the committee on agriculture with respect to precautionary measures against the growing evil of sheep-killing by dogs in the rural district. One suggestion made to the committee was that every dog wear a tag of identification. It is further proposed that all dog taxes be paid into the county treasury instead of into the townships or towns.

SIGNED IN HASTE TO REPENT AT LEISURE

The Petrolia Advertiser-Topic says: Several of our citizens are sitting up 'o' nights trying to figure out the best way to get out of a dilemma in which they find themselves. Last November a representative of a Chautauqua company visited Petrolia and endeavored to interest the Chamber of Commerce in putting on a Chautauqua here this summer. The idea appealed to individual members and others who forthwith—twenty-seven of them—signed an agreement, many apparently not knowing what they were signing. Now that they know they claim a misunderstanding and negotiations have been entered into to break the contract which calls for guaranteeing the sale of 350 tickets at \$2 each, furnishing lumber, putting up platforms, supplying lights, drinking water and all that. As the company refuses to release the signers of the document it looks as if a lawsuit will result.

DEATH OF ARCHIBALD MCGUGAN

McGugan, engineer, Westminster township; Florence and D. F. McGugan of Toronto. The funeral was held from his late residence at Mount Brydges to Longwood cemetery on Tuesday afternoon.
