Such a scheme is distinctly a commercial effort, and if permitted by the board would lead to demands being made by all manner of business concerns for the same privilege of boosting their products by a campaign amongst the school children. "Personally," he added, "I am of the opinion that all that the dairymen need stode to boost the sale and greater use of their product is to raise the standard of quality and lower the price, both of which I believe could be quite easily done without damage to the milk or to the profits of the business.
