Starting March 21, a graded surcharge to cover the rate of exchange will be made on all railroad tickets sold in Canada for points in the United States, according to information received to day by the local passenger agents. In the same message it was announced that the rate of exchange will be fixed twice monthly by the Canadian Railway Association; the rate prevailing on the first day of each month governing until the fourteenth day, when the rate will be fixed for the remainder of the month. From March 21 to March 31, inclusive, the rate will be 15 per cent.

So that the surcharge could be applied justly to all parts of Canada, it will be graded into three classes according to the distance of the point from the border. At points on the border the full rate will be charged from the border the full rate will be charged. From stations comparatively near the frontier a 75 per cent surcharge will be made, while those at greater distances it, will be placed in 50 per cent or 25 per cent.
