London, Feb. 14.—(Montreal Gazette cable)—A scheme for settling overseas the widows and families of fallen soldiers is the object of the trip to Canada of Commissioner David Lamb of the Salvation Army immigration department, who sailed by the Misanabie. Prior to sailing, he had interviews with the Colonial Secretary and the President of the Board of Trade.

"We fully recognize," said Commissioner Lamb, in an interview, "that Canada will have to deal with the Dominion's great resources, but with the insistent demand for women servants, Canada's own problem does not appear to present serious economic difficulty. There is no danger of the Mother Country saddling the Dominion with the former's responsibilities, nor of the contemplated settlers becoming a burden to the community, as many would be in receipt of pensions. These families of men who had sacrificed themselves for the Empire should prove a valuable contribution to the inflow of British stock, which would be more than ever desirable if the newest conceptions of a strong Empire are to be realized."

Commissioner Lamb thought that the Salvation Army's capacity for handling the proposed scheme would be recognized by the Dominion, as the army officers are familiar with Canadian conditions, are accustomed to dealing with rollers, and have an excellent immigration machinery at their disposal. Moreover, the army has for several years paid special attention to the needs of widows, and the active part played by the army in the Empress of Ireland widows' fund.

REPORT OF A MURDER

U.S. POLICE BELIEVE TO HAVE UNEARTHED A MURDERER

To Destroy Buildings and Inert Men in a Dozen United States—The De

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Search was started today for the principals in what is believed by the police to have been a plot to destroy buildings and kill members of the clergy, bankers and others, in a dozen cities in various sections of the United States. Discovery of the alleged plot according to the police resulted from examination of the personal effects of John Allegri, confidant of Jean Crozes, who is charged by the authorities with putting poison in soup at the banquet given Archbishop Mundelein at the University Club Thursday night and causing the illness
